Randy Pausch, the positive, energetic college professor, became widely known for his "Last Lecture" that was delivered at Carnegie Mellon University on September 18, 2007. The book, based on the lecture, was co-written by Pausch and Wall Street Journal reporter Jeffrey Zaslow in 2008.

In the lecture, Pausch talks about his childhood dreams (and how he achieved them), enabling the dreams of others, and lessons learned: How you can achieve your dreams or enable the dreams of others. When Pausch wrote his lecture, he did so as a lasting legacy for his children after being diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. From BHS to OSU to The Q

Grad Scores Spot On Professional Dance Team

t the Cavalier Girls dance team tryouts last year, 170 women showed up, including one BHS alumna. The first cut brought that number down to 60, and from that group, judges selected the 20 women who would inspire fan excitement by performing before crowds that can exceed 20,000. When captured on TV, that amount mushrooms into the millions.

2011 BHS graduate Jasmine was one of the talents chosen to be a dance team member for the present season. (Cavalier Girls' policy prevents the use of last names in media coverage.) As she describes it, she quickly learned how being a Cavalier Girl involves some high energy transmission. When she hits the floor to perform a routine and looks out at fans, she feeds off their reactions, just as they feed off her enthusiasm.

But she makes a frank admission that, despite being surrounded by some great NBA talent and being a few feet from one of the greatest in the history of the game, her focus is on dancing.

"I'm not paying attention to the players," she says during a pre-game interview at Quicken Loans Arena. "It's all about the fans and performing."

Dancing requires complete focus to prevent missing even a single step, she adds. But has she talked to LeBron? Schmoozed with any of the Cavs? Taken a single selfie with anyone? No.

Jasmine also plays multiple roles in Beachwood by serving as the BHS drill team adviser and JV cheerleading coach. She fills out her days working as a special education assistant teacher in both BHS and BMS, too. These additional roles reflect her passions for both dance and working with children.

After high school graduation, Jasmine headed to The Ohio State University where she was a dance major, and during her junior year, she made it onto the school's dance team, a very strong and nationally competitive group. With performances at home football and basketball games, the role demanded an enormous time commitment. The team members were considered student athletes and had full schedules composed of threehour practices twice a week in the evening, community appearances, team workouts, Universal Dance Association college dance team national competitions, and game day performances. She recalls it all as an intense experience, but with a big payoff.

"I still remember the feeling I got dancing at my first football game in front of 100,000 screaming Buckeye fans," she says, and the school spirit continues to stay with her. Her Cavalier Girl's nickname is "Ohio," and she wears her 2014 national championship ring very proudly.

She's always been a huge Cavs fan, too, although she admits that when attending a game, her attention was more often drawn to the Cavalier Girls. With the squad central to her thinking when her OSU graduation approached, she launched a campaign to get the attention of the team's coaches in advance of tryouts.

"I sent an email to get my name out there and to differentiate myself from everyone else," she explains. In her message, she noted that she had national stage experience by being on the OSU dance team. What she didn't know then but later learned was that her OSU dance team coach also sent a message to the Cavalier Girls coaches to let them know that "a star" was arriving from Columbus.

Being a Cavalier Girl could truly make a woman feel very much the part of a celebrity with public appearances, autographing opportunities, beautiful costumes, hair and makeup sessions before games and even a 2016-17 swimsuit calendar (sold for \$10 in the team gift store). But that doesn't capture how Jasmine feels about her role.

"I'm still me, but I'm a professional now," she says.

What also guides her feelings and contributes to her humility is a speech challenge she has managed since childhood.

"My speech is something I've been ashamed of, so I always thought that things wouldn't happen for me. When they do, it's such a blessing," she relates.

Dance offers a great comfort zone, too, to the point where she is not at all nervous before game performances.

"I'm excited and feel prepared, and if I don't have those feelings, then it's my own fault."

By the end of the night, exhaustion reigns supreme, and after a game, she goes straight home, showers and heads right to sleep.

She says that making it onto the dance team was essentially the best birthday present she could possibly receive, since she discovered the big news a day before her 22nd celebration.

"I got the call at 8 am, two days after tryouts ended. I was told to come straight to The Q to shoot a video bio," presently posted on the Cavs website at http://www.nba.com/ cavaliers/video/teams/cavaliers/2015/09/18 /21213/1442605793583-cavsgirlbiojasmine. mp4-21213. Emily Smith, director of dance and entertainment for all dance squads that perform at The Q (Cavalier Girls, Monsters, Gladiators and Canton Charge), notes how she was especially impressed by Jasmine's exceptional ability to spin and leap.

"She can perform more pirouettes than anyone. She's phenomenal at it."

For the try outs, Smith reports that what many may not know is how the candidates receive a study packet to learn about the game and the Cavaliers' roster, all of which appears on a test. They also have an interview with team executives covering their background and goals. The dance portion of the tryout involves performing solo, in small groups and large groups.

Throughout the season, the Cavalier Girls' schedule involves practices two to three times per week, from 6-10 pm, to polish old routines and prepare new ones. The team rotates 16 girls in for each game while four sit out during the 41 home game regular season.

"We're constantly learning new choreography," Jasmine says, admitting that she catches on quickly, with a great memory for movement. The team keeps the routines current and fresh by also frequently changing the songs that accompany its routines.

On game days, the squad arrives at 3:45 pm to start preparing. During play time, in addition to performing dance routines, the girls fan out throughout the arena to appear in suites, concourse C, the Loudville section and on the floor during game breaks for special promotions. The dancers also make numerous community appearances to spread team spirit and generate excitement at locations including local hospitals, the Veterans Administration, nursing homes, malls, schools and at corporate functions.

Her work in Beachwood allows her to say that she is tapping into all her interests since children figure prominently into them.

"I love being able to inspire students by day and Cavalier fans by night," she says, adding that she never imagined she'd have both in her life simultaneously and so soon.

"I thought I'd be a professional dancer for a while and when that career was over, I would go into education," she explains. Ultimately, she can see herself teaching dance in a public school setting. In pursuit of that potential path, she recently applied to graduate school to earn a Master's degree in teaching and to obtain her licensure.

Jasmine's earliest exposure to dance was at the Jordan Center Dance in Warrensville Heights where she enjoyed tap and jazz. She realized that it was her passion when she was 10 years old, getting ready for a performance. She told her mom, "This is what I'm supposed to be doing."

Jasmine entered BHS as a junior, and was the cheerleading captain as a senior. The OSU dance program was a change of pace and stressed ballet and modern dance, where she says she gained an appreciation for those forms as well.

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


It's Her Nature: Works by Eileen Dorsey, Sharlene Green, Marti Higgins and Wally Kaplan

"Team Simon Strong" Raises Brain Tumor Awareness

Gliablastoma multiforme, radiation, chemo, apherisis, mediport, stem cells, oncology, Seidman, clinical trial – these words were pretty foreign to Andy Simon and his wife, Amy, until a few months ago when Andy was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor.

Andy was diagnosed on a Monday in November and underwent surgery to remove the tumor on Friday, and now these words are part of the Simons' lives, 24/7.

"The tumor came out of

nowhere," Amy, told us. "Andy led a healthy lifestyle and was at an optimal weight.

She paused before adding, "And this is not genetic."

The diagnosis of a brain tumor doesn't have to be a death sentence," Andy told us. "You can still go on."

In spite of his treatments, Andy keeps a positive attitude and recognizes there is hope.

Prior to his diagnosis, Andy hadn't missed a day of work in 30 years. Although he's missed some work in the past few months, he told us

that following surgery, he was in ICU for fewer than 24 hours, was back to running two weeks later, and really didn't need rehab.

As a result of Andy's diagnosis, the Simons have been doing some research about brain tumors and are taking action to raise funds and awareness about this condition.

In June, Andy, along with family and friends, will participate in the BT5K Breakthrough for Brain Tumors Run & Walk, the American Brain Tumor Association's national signature fundraising event. To date, 228 teams are formed in 8 **Race Details:**

Heritage Home ProgramSM Provides Beachwood Homeowners with Free Home Improvement Advice and Subsidized-Rate Financing

For 23 years, the Cleveland Restoration Society has operated the Heritage Home ProgramSM in order to provide the owners of older homes with access to advice on restoring and improving their properties. For houses located in a participating community such as Beachwood, homeowners have free access to a site visit with a construction specialist, information on local contractors, and impartial review of any estimates received from contractors. Color consultations for exterior painting are provided at no cost. The Heritage Home ProgramSM also offers a subsidized-rate loan to cover the costs of eligible improvement and maintenance projects. This financing option is in the form of a fixedrate equity loan with a current rate of 2%. Most projects are eligible for this financing option.

Originating in two historic districts within the City of Cleveland, the program now operates throughout more than 40 regional communities. In order to qualify, properties need not be designated as historic in any way – they simply need to be at least 50 years old. Even in 'younger' cities such as Beachwood, an overwhelming percentage of the housing stock meets this 50-year-old benchmark.

Beachwood's mid-century housing stock is unique in its consistent use of high-quality building materials. Cedar-shake siding, slate and tile roofs, and stone or brick exteriors are all common. This fact places Beachwood's mid-century gems at the very top of the quality range among post-war developments. By implementing these traditional materials and design elements, architects and builders used construction projects in Beachwood to bridge the gap between the Colonial Revival exteriors of the Heights and the long, low homes so favored in post-war America. On the interior, chopped up living areas were abandoned in

favor of open floor plans. Expansive walls of windows and sliding glass doors often opened onto exterior patios, helping to bring the exterior and interior living spaces together. Clean, simple geometries and a tendency towards asymmetry added to the sense of modernity.

In recent years, the attitude toward these mid-century homes has changed entirely. As they reach their 50th and 60th birthdays, mid-century designs and materials that once seemed dated and undesirable are now viewed as unique and worthy of preservation. Instead of ripping out their interior paneling and brightly colored bathroom tile, homeowners are now creating remodel designs that accentuate and showcase these modern elements. Additionally, new home buyers and young families are widening their house searches to include the once-passé ranch home. The pendulum of taste has swung from outdated to trendy and mod.

Through their direct interaction with homeowners and home buyers, the Heritage Home ProgramSM staff has witnessed this change of perception firsthand. The project pictured herein is a perfect example. Purchasing this home from its original owner, the buyers of this Beachwood property knew they were in for a long list of interior remodeling projects. They also knew, however, that their desire was to stay true to the mid-century era of the home. The remodeling was carefully planned to be an even balance of old and new. The entry foyer retains its original glass block partition wall, paneling and staircase railing. In the main living area, the floor plan was opened up to create one large living space. The remodeled kitchen, done in flat-panel contemporary cabinets, overlooks the living and dining areas and the backyard beyond. The asymmetrical fireplace surround was painted a warm gray to lighten

the space and coordinate with the serene color palette throughout. Contemporary pendant lights were selected to brighten the space. Elsewhere in the house, the homeowners saved other original design elements. In the basement, the wet bar was left untouched and the Jetsons-esque pool table, bought by the home's first owner, resides in the children's playroom. Upstairs, the main bathroom was painted and given new lighting, but the baby blue tile and bathroom fixtures were left as is. The entirety of the project struck a balance between preservation and modernization.

"I believe that preserving our old houses is a great way to end up with a more creative and interesting living environment," says Michael Caito, the project architect. "Beachwood has a plethora of mid-century homes situated on well-landscaped lots that have great bones, spacious rooms, a lot of glass, and are built with quality materials. Many of these homes just need to be refreshed, or possibly reprogrammed (like swapping out a living room for an expanded kitchen family room space). These homes will look good and feel 'fresh' well into this century."

Through support from the City of Beachwood, the services of the Heritage Home ProgramSM are available at no cost to the owners of houses over 50 years old. 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



REVENUE

- The District's revenues in 2015 were \$41,424,807, a decrease of 14.5 percent over 2014 due primarily to the District receiving unbudgeted revenue as the result of the settlement of litigation regarding the valuation of real property in 2014 and a decrease in property tax collections in 2015 due to higher delinguency rates.
- Program Revenues, \$7,246,513 are for specific program areas and comprise 17.5 percent of the District's total revenues.
- General Revenues accounted for \$28,673,384 in revenue or 69.2 percent of all revenues. The largest portion of general revenues is property taxes levied on commercial and residential properties.
- Grants and Entitlements, \$5,504,910, are from the State of Ohio and the federal government. The revenues from the State of Ohio consist of rollback and homestead taxes, through which the state pays 12.5% of each residential property owner's taxes. The State also pays the district through its Foundation Funding program with funds earmarked in the State budget for education. This category of revenues also contains the tangible personal property (TPP) tax hold-harmless provision in the amount of \$2.5 million.

LOCAL TAXES COLLECTED

Property Tax dollars collected for the general fund from operating levies are used to pay for day-to-day operating expenses of the District, including salaries, benefits, utilities, books, materials, and equipment.

- Local property taxes collected from Commercial Real Estate for Fiscal Year 2015 totaled \$15,883,017, or 52.1 percent of total taxes collected.
- The District collected \$13,508,792, or 44.3 percent, in Residential Real Estate taxes in fiscal year 2015.
- · Beachwood has not had an operating levy on the ballot since 2005

Public Utility Taxes are assessed on tangible personal property, as well as land and improvements, at true value (normally 50 percent of cost).

• The District collected \$1,114,570, or 3.6 percent of total taxes collected, from public utility property taxes in Fiscal Year 2015.



Moody's Investor Service confirmed the district's Aaa credit rating. Beachwood Schools is one of only four school districts in the State of Ohio to be awarded this rating.

EXPENSES

Governmental Activities totaled \$39,952,482, a slight increase of 1.7 percent from Fiscal Year 2014 (from government-wide statements), primarily due to relatively flat salaries in Fiscal Year 14 due to the retirement of 11 staff members in 2014 who were replaced by staff members who were hired in lower on the salary scale and a decrease in interest and fiscal charges.



LONG-TERM PROJECTIONS

Funding for public education continues to be challenging as school choice proponents try to expand voucher programs for all Ohio students irrespective of the quality of their local public schools. Beachwood Schools already receives very little in state funding for education – less than \$665 per pupil. State vouchers redirect \$5,900 per pupil to charter schools. Ohio's school choice program is already noted for its lack of oversight of academic expectations and fiscal operating standards.

The burden of funding public schools continues to shift from the State back to local public schools. The State's budget bill, House Bill 64, eliminated the hold harmless provision of the tangible personal property tax, which historically taxed commercial property owners on inventory. The district collected \$2.5 million annually via the hold harmless provision. The loss of funding to the schools is \$1.3 million commencing FY 17. In December, the legislature enacted a one time subsidy to cover 96% of this loss, but then will continue to eliminate this revenue stream commencing in FY 18. The School District by 2020 will have lost this revenue stream in its entirety. This equates to 3.5 mills in property taxes.

Despite losing revenue from the State of Ohio, Beachwood Schools will continue to be innovators and will plan for the future with the focus on students remaining the crux of every decision.



The UH Harrington Heart & Vascular Institute anchored a comprehensive program that includes diagnostic stress and ECHO tests; electrophysiology and cardiac ablation programs; cardiac catheterization as well as angioplasty; and open heart surgery including bypass and valve replacement procedures. Complex thoracic, foregut and colorectal surgery is also available.

In 2015, the Neurological Institute at UH Ahuja Medical Center began to offer treatment for low-risk intracranial hemorrhagic strokes. In addition, UH Ahuja Medical Center has quickly become the region's leader in orthopaedic surgery including spine, shoulder, ankle, elbow and total joint replacements.

But even those who have not been treated at UH Ahuja Medical Center have benefited from its presence.

Under Juris' leadership, the hospital's community outreach gave free CPR classes to 3,000 people in 2015 alone – and its goal is nothing less than that all high-school seniors in the area graduate knowing CPR. Then there's the Initiative for Building Lifesaving Communities, which has donated a total of 18 LUCAS devices to surrounding communities. The LUCAS is a state-of-the-art




cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) system that is used by emergency medical services teams to more effectively stabilize heart attack victims in the field. This initiative has become systemwide, helping many more communities in crisis.

UH Ahuja Medical Center's objective has just as strong a focus on educating people about health. These efforts range from the Beachwood Medical Academy, which is the first academic program that provides exposure to advanced health care career options for high school students, to the New Leaf program at Warrensville Heights Middle School, which included installing a salad bar in the cafeteria and supplying fresh fruits and vegetables to students at no charge.

For adults, there have been numerous city-centered health challenges held so residents could learn how to address their personal health challenges. Annual health fairs provided more education, and free screenings in such areas as heart health, diabetes and skin cancer. UH Ahuja Medical Center also created a Wednesday Night Wellness health education series for the community that was so successful that it evolved into a systemwide UH series called Health Matters.

When UH Ahuja Medical Center opened, it was big news – it was the first 'built from the ground up' hospital in Cuyahoga County in 30 years. The



hospital was named for UH benefactor Monte and Usha Ahuja and their family, and it was a significant part of University Hospitals \$1 billion expansion.

Today, in the same year that University Hospitals celebrates its 150th anniversary, its newest outpost has become a key landmark along Richmond and Harvard roads, and Interstate 271.

Its patients and visitors benefit from such 'soft' amenities as a quarter-mile lighted walking trail that winds through the grounds, a pond, and a labyrinth for walking meditation and a glimpse of peace during what might be a very stressful time. Inside, the first floor lobby also features a meditation room.

Many of the features incorporated at UH Ahuja Medical Center were, and are, innovative because when the medical center was in the planning stages, UH reached out to employees and residents. Their ideas were incorporated along with those of the hospital's designers. Ground-absorbing materials throughout the hospital reduce noise; patient's bathrooms are placed near the beds to reduce falls; in patient rooms, a sink area allows caregivers to clean their hands and prepare medication. Comfortable sofas turn into sleeping couches if a family member wants to stay overnight.

"A safe and positive patient experience, and the provision of the highest-quality care, is always our priority," says Juris. The hospital nursing staff has adopted two powerful best practices to assure positive outcomes for patients. Hourly nursing rounds ensure that patients' needs are regularly addressed and the bedside nursing change-of-shift report allows patients and families to be



updated on the plan of care and to have their questions answered. Both practices optimize safety at UH Ahuja Medical Center.

Juris and her team listen to the voice of their patients. The hospital's emergency room has become one of the busiest in the region. Many people who come with less acute problems often were seen after the more acute, life-threatening emergency cases were treated. To make it easier to access UH Ahuja Medical Center's emergent care, the leaders created a "Fast Track" triage and treatment area just for this population who are in and out in under two hours.

The hospital also opened a pediatric inpatient unit on the request of many families in the area who have children with health issues that can be managed closer to home. This complements the UH Rainbow Babies & Children's emergency department, the Marcy R. Horvitz Pediatric Emergency Center, which includes six rooms that are pediatric-friendly, with a waiting area with smaller furniture and a serenity fountain to calm children.

As Juris says, "UH Ahuja Medical Center has become an asset to our communities. We will remain vigilant to ensure safe, effective and personalized care is delivered to all of our patients and their families."

Operation Finale: The Capture and Trial of Adolf Eichmann

– New Exhibition Uses Recently Declassified Material to Reveal the Secret History Behind High-Profile Nazi War Criminal's Capture and Trial

The Nazi responsible for the transport of millions of innocent people to death camps might well have lived out his days in Argentina as "Ricardo Klement," if fate, a Holocaust survivor and Israel's foreign intelligence service, hadn't intervened. A multimedia exhibition produced by the Maltz Museum of Jewish Heritage in collaboration with The Mossad -Israeli Secret Intelligence Service and Beit Hatfutsot - The Museum of the Jewish People, Tel Aviv, featuring recently declassified artifacts never before seen outside of Israel, reveals the secret history behind the capture, extradition and trial of one of the world's most notorious escaped war criminals.

Operation Finale: The Capture and Trial of Adolf Eichmann will be on exhibit at the Maltz Museum (2929 Richmond Road, Beachwood) through June 12.

"This is the first time the Mossad has allowed archival materials related to one of its clandestine operations to leave Israel," asserts Maltz Museum executive director Ellen Rudolph. "We've been working with our international partners for more than two years to assemble this new exhibition and we're thrilled to debut it here before traveling it to museums across the country."

'Operation Finale' references the code name given to the Mossad's effort to capture and abduct Eichmann. "The exhibition offers an unprecedented opportunity to see impressive pre-digital-era espionage with all its accompanying maps, printed case files, hand-forged documents and even a pair of goggles used to obscure Eichmann's vision during the abduction," says former agent

and espionage expert Avner Avraham, who curated the materials for the Mossad in Israel. With 60 original artifacts and 70 photographs, the 4,000-squarefoot exhibition details exactly how agents located a perpetrator of "The Final Solution" hiding in South America and smuggled him to Israel to stand trial for crimes against the Jewish people. "The entire dramatic story is told, including never-before-revealed details of a 'Plan B' backup escape strategy devised in case the initial scheme failed," explains Avraham.

Short films within Operation Finale allow exhibition-goers to hear directly from the abduction team that caught the SS lieutenant colonel and the legal team that prosecuted him. An immersive video installation, housing the iconic bulletproof glass booth from which a dispassionate Eichmann testified, drops visitors right into the historic 1961 trial. "Although it was more than 15 years after the end of World War II, this was the first time many survivors publicly shared their stories," says Beit Hatfutsot Chief Curator Dr. Orit Shaham Gover. "These moving accounts of pain, suffering, courage and survival were broadcast across the globe, providing a deeper, more complete understanding of the Holocaust that became not only a living part of Jewish identity, but of the world's conscience."

Operation Finale illustrates the enormity of the crimes committed during the Nazi regime and explores issues of justice and accountability. A high school dropout who lost his job as a salesman during the Depression in 1933, Eichmann rose to prominence in the Nazi party by zealously applying his logistical skills to the efficient execution of state-sponsored genocide. He never expressed remorse. "I was not a responsible leader, and as such do not feel myself guilty," he wrote, asking for clemency.

"Eleven million people, including six million Jews, were systematically murdered when their neighbors and countrymen perhaps motivated by fear or a desire to get ahead—accepted a worldview that required them to suppress their humanity," says Rudolph. "The exhibition drives home the need to remain firm in our moral convictions and ever vigilant against indifference and intolerance in the world."

As survivor and longtime Maltz Museum volunteer, Erika Gold states in an Operation Finale film, "We must talk about the Holocaust so it will never happen again."

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
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
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
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
