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The more I listen to the news, the more I want to stay away from it. It's hard to isolate ourselves from realities that surround us – crime, mass shootings, political distrust, and sensationalism. Much of what surrounds us is devastating; plus, stories are often reported with an editorial bias that may manipulate the truth, or are framed to describe the perspective from which they are told.

Words matter. We internalize messages based on how they're presented or framed. *Scientific American* published an article that quoted Lera Boroditsky, a cognitive scientist at the University of California, San Diego, about the significance of why words matter and how language changes our perceptions of the world. As an example of framing she shares:

"If I tell you this hamburger is 80 percent lean as opposed to 20 percent fat, then in some sense I am communicating the same thing. But what people get from those two communications is very different: People perceive the 80 percent lean hamburger as much healthier than the 20 percent fat option. When we choose to frame something, we cue others to think about it in a specific way. We can change someone's perspective by changing the frame."

Words have power. They can make or break someone. I've heard many stories about how someone was told something – positive or negative – that determined their life's path. Negativity discourages people and diminishes their self-esteem. Encouragement creates positive energy that supports a person's goals and dreams.

Words create credibility. We like to be around people we trust. Stephen M.R. Covey writes: "Trust is about credibility, which boils down into four issues: **integrity, intent, capabilities, and results.**"

He explains:

Integrity is much more than just being honest. It's walking your talk. It's being congruent, inside and out. It's having the courage to act in accordance with your values and beliefs.

Intent has to do with our motives, our agendas and our resulting behavior. Trust grows when our motives are straightforward and based on mutual benefit. When we suspect a hidden agenda from someone or we don't believe they are acting in our best interests, we are suspicious about everything they say and do.

Capabilities are the abilities we have that inspire confidence: our talents, attitudes, skills, knowledge and style. They are the means we use to produce results. A family doctor might have integrity and his motives might be good, but unless he's trained and skilled to perform the task at hand, he'll be lacking in credibility in that area. Capabilities also deal with our ability to establish, grow, extend, and restore trust.

Results refer to our track record, our performance, our getting the right things done. If we don't accomplish what we are expected to do, it diminishes our credibility. On the other hand, when we achieve the results we promised, we establish a positive reputation of performing and our reputation precedes us. Both capabilities and results are matters of competence.

I've been publishing *Beachwood Buzz* for almost 23 years and am proud to have created a magazine that frames things in a positive manner. I love to share individual and group achievements, community events, the beauty that surrounds us, and non-controversial aspects of living, working, and playing in Beachwood. Often, the content I publish in this column is based on motivational books and articles I've read. The more I read, the

more I internalize. The more I internalize a message, the more embedded it becomes in my belief system; and the more embedded it becomes, the more it benefits my overall health and well-being.

The messages of many talented authors resonate with me, like the following list that was recently published by author and speaker Jon Gordon:

The words we speak matter. They help to shape the world around us. That's why I believe we need to speak words of truth and hope, not only to ourselves but to others as well. Here are 20 things we should say more often if we want to make the world more positive:

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Excruciating leg pain? Learn more about sciatica.

Do you have pain radiating down one leg, especially below the knee? How about numbness in the hip, thigh, knee or ankle? You may be experiencing sciatica, pain caused by a problem with the sciatic nerve – the longest, widest nerve in the body.

“Sciatica can cause excruciating pain for some, or just be bothersome for others,” explains Marzena Buzanowska, MD, an interventional spine specialist at Cleveland

Clinic Hillcrest and South Pointe hospitals. “Once we pinpoint the cause we can aid in relief.”

Common causes of sciatica include a herniated disk (a disk that is pushed out of place) and lumbar spine stenosis (a narrowing of the spinal cord in the lower back).

Why sciatica develops

The sciatic nerve is made up of smaller nerves that branch out from both sides of the lower spinal cord. These join together, then split in

two to run down – and bring movement and sensation to – each hip, buttock and leg.

Compression along the nerve causes symptoms, usually on the affected side. Burning or shooting pains make walking, sitting and standing up – or even coughing and sneezing – difficult.

Sciatica usually lasts for a couple of weeks, but may persist for a couple of months or even longer.

Treating sciatica

Dr. Buzanowska recommends starting treatment conservatively, with physical therapy. If that does not help, spinal injections may be considered. Surgery is usually the last resort.

“Most sciatica patients do not require surgery. Time, medication and physical therapy usually do the trick,” says Dr. Buzanowska.

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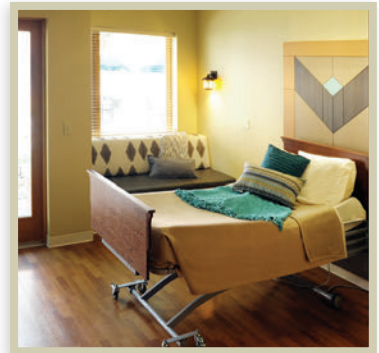

2019 BEACHWOOD FALL FESTIVAL

The 3rd Annual Beachwood Fall Festival, presented by the City of Beachwood, Beachwood City Schools, and Beachwood Chamber of Commerce will take place on Sunday, October 6, 12 noon – 5 pm, at the Beachwood Municipal Center. This year, Joe Everson, a renaissance man, artist, vocalist, musician, photographer, and entertainer, will share his live-action artwork talents with audience members at 1 and 3 pm.

Videos of Joe singing while painting have gone viral with more than 220 million total views. All the hype around Joe's talent has led to national bookings with professional sports teams, Fortune 500 companies, celebrities, and now: the City of Beachwood!

"Joe is the only formally trained vocalist/ artist in America," said Daniel Lyles, Joe's agent and art dealer. "He comes from a musical family and learned to paint with singing/action painting in mind. Joe's career picked up about two-and-a-half years ago, with his high-energy, one-of-a-kind performances. Whether or not you have seen him in videos, there's nothing like seeing his live performances. He truly puts a twist on anything you may have seen elsewhere."

Joe liked to break the rules and was inspired by a former art teacher's advice, a riff on Picasso's own words, "The best artists learn the rules, so they know how to break them." Everson decided early on to take a divergent path. A rebellious spirit, he believed class assignments were a waste of time, much preferring his own abstract form of expression than heavily moderated direction.

After high school, Joe faced the uncertainty brought by art careers. He opted for something more stable, but when the need to create got the better of him, he took the plunge.

"I feel like a lot of people think they have to do it one way. It's hard not to, because there's

a lot of security in that," Joe says. "But high risk often brings good rewards."

Joe got his reward when a video of him singing the National Anthem while painting an image of the "Raising of the Flag on Iwo Jima," at an ECHL hockey game in Ohio went viral. The next day, he went on national television in front of 2 million viewers to repeat the performance. Within an hour of the performance, his manager received more than 400 emails from veterans and for booking requests.

Everson now travels the nation doing live-action painting performances while singing. He's been featured on ESPN, FOX Sports, SB Nation, NHL.com, Washington Times, CBS Sports, Huffington Post, FOX News and has had nationwide coverage from media and celebrities. Arnold Schwarzenegger is one of his biggest supporters with four of Joe's paintings in his private collection. Joe has performed for the Golden State Warriors, Milwaukee Bucks, Florida Panthers, San Antonio Spurs, William Shatner, and JJ Watt.

Joe said, "I am honored to have an exhibition in the same space where great artists like Peter Max and Romero Britto have showcased their art. Ohio is where my first video went viral and where some of my biggest collectors live. I am excited to meet the people of Beachwood."

Joe's art will be on display and for sale in the Beachwood Community Center from September 25 through October 17. Dan will moderate a Q&A session after Joe's 3 pm performance; and Joe will be available for an artist meet-and-greet and signing session.

School Bus Regulations

When a school bus is stopped on a roadway to pick up or drop off passengers, the following regulations apply to other drivers on the roadway.

When a school bus driver is preparing to stop the bus, he or she activates four amber lights – two on the front and two on the rear of the bus. These lights continue to flash until the bus is fully stopped. Other vehicles are not required to stop during this preliminary stage of the eight-light warning but should prepare to stop as soon as the bus comes to a full stop. When the bus comes to a complete stop, the amber lights stop flashing and four red lights – two in the front and two in the back – start flashing while the children enter or leave the bus. In addition, a stop arm with flashing red lights is automatically extended

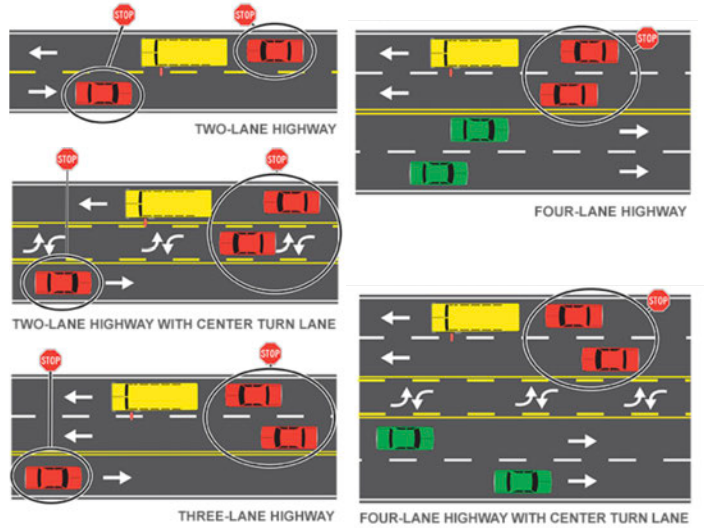
beneath the window on the left side of the bus.

If the bus is stopped on a street or road which has fewer than four lanes, all traffic approaching the bus from either direction must stop at least 10 feet from the front or rear of the bus and remain stopped until the bus begins to move or the bus driver signals motorists to proceed.

If the bus is stopped on a street or road which has four or more lanes, only traffic proceeding in the same direction as the bus must stop.

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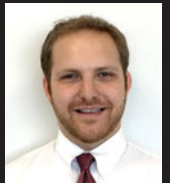


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No Barriers

Erik Weihenmayer was 4 years old when he was diagnosed with retinoschisis. He was blind by age 13. His mother was killed in a car accident the summer going into his sophomore year of high school. He described her death as a thousand times as painful as going blind. Many would have shut down, paralyzed by self pity, played it safe, or given up. Not Erik. It isn't that he didn't have those feelings, he did, but he chose to challenge himself, to confront barriers, to push through, to persevere.

Erik became the first blind person to reach the summit of Mt. Everest. He has climbed each of the world's Seven Summits, comprised of the highest mountain on each of the seven continents: Everest, Aconcagua, Denali, Kilimanjaro, Elbrus, Vinson Massif, and Carstensz Pyramid.

Erik co-founded a non profit organization called No Barriers. Its mission is to help people with challenges – *everyone* – turn into the storm of life, face barriers head on, embrace a pioneering and innovative spirit, and team

up with great people to live rich in meaning and purpose. The organization's motto is, "**What's within you is stronger than what's in your way.**"

Erik promotes a "No Barriers Mindset." He knows that life is full of challenges, unexpected turns and rapids that come from nowhere and pull you under; and that it is up to each person to learn to push through the unexpected, the pain, the perceived barriers, the loss, to make life meaningful.

The Weight of Water documentary follows Erik as he kayaks the

length of the Grand Canyon. Erik Weihenmayer exemplifies and promotes resilience, perseverance, and courage. For him, as for most of us, the mental challenges are far greater than the physical. His self-talk is productive, strong, and consistent: *Break it down. Just one turn at a time. Be fully present in this moment. Don't worry about what may happen.* He reminds himself repeatedly that it is not helpful or healthy to worry about what may happen next, the many things that could go wrong, the potential catastrophe. His practice is to try and be at peace in the moment he is in and let everything else go. To just breathe.

No matter how challenging, frightening, or overwhelming, we must keep pushing through, riding the rapids of life, and learning to roll up. We must persevere.

At one point in the documentary, after a particularly harrowing experience, Erik shared insight into his approach: The key is to fully commit to the challenge. To surround yourself with a team you trust and can count on to encourage, guide, and support you. Then push through whatever scares you. Keep pushing through. Just when you think you can't or you won't get through, you are through it.

This, I believe, is applicable to all of our lives. To every mountain we must climb, every rapid that pulls us under, every fear we must face head on.

His friend, Lonnie, also blind, who kayaks alongside him on this adventure, says with a smile on his face, "As long as I can roll

up as many times as I roll down I am golden."

So, I guess in life, we best figure out ways to keep rolling up.

Erik promotes a "No Barriers Mindset." He knows that life is full of challenges, unexpected turns and rapids that come from nowhere and pull you under; and that it is up to each person to learn to push through the unexpected, the pain, the perceived barriers, the loss, to make life meaningful.

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"The truth is that adversity is a part of most days. Whether you are ultimately weakened or strengthened by each event, or the accumulation of events, will depend on you first mastering the ability to 'Take It On!'

"People have the inner resources to become anything they want to be. Challenge just becomes the vehicle for tapping into those inner resources.

"You don't just deal with adversity. You use it to propel you forward."

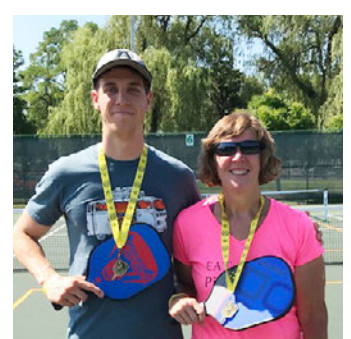

Local Honey for the Holidays

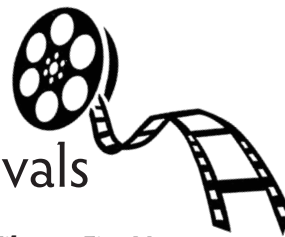

As chair of the Jewish Federation of Cleveland's 2020 Campaign for Jewish Needs, attorney Jeff Wild hopes to raise the bar even higher.



"Last year, the Campaign for Jewish Needs raised more than \$32.7 million from more than ten thousands donors," says Jeff. "Now, more than ever, it's crucial that our donors increase that total to help secure the safety of our buildings and institutions and to provide funding for our agencies that impact the lives of so many members of our diverse Jewish community."

Due to the recent anti-Semitic attacks in Pittsburgh and San Diego, the Federation's security costs have skyrocketed from about one million dollars a year to the current \$3.2 million a year.

"What I appreciate about the Federation is that it's the one organization that looks out for the welfare of everyone in our Jewish community," says Jeff. "Through the Federation's security-readiness training and multiple resources, our beneficiary agencies have the tools and trained personnel to make every place as safe as possible where Jews gather to work, pray, learn, play, study and socialize."

Jeff, 46, a partner at Benesch, Friedlander, Coplan & Aronoff, as well as the firm's administrative partner, chief strategy officer, and chair of the Real Estate and Environmental Practice Group, spends at least 10 to 15 hours a week volunteering during campaign season.

"I've been passionate about the Federation ever since I moved here from New York with my wife, Danielle, a native Clevelander, 22 years ago," Jeff says. "No other Jewish organization has a greater impact on the entire community than our Federation. Every dollar spent changes and improves the lives of Jews in Cleveland, Israel, and around the world. Whether one is unaffiliated or Orthodox, the Federation provides a place for all of us to gather together, to train new leaders, to educate our children, to respond in times of crisis, and to help grow Jewish Cleveland."

The generosity and philanthropy of Cleveland's Jewish community continues to amaze Jeff, who marvels that people of all ages and walks of life come together as one to show their support for each other and to demonstrate their solidarity with the global Jewish community.

Jeff credits his commitment to "giving back" to the guidance of his parents and to the encouragement of his wife and three sons. Along with serving as chair of the Federation's Allocations Committee, Jeff was board president of Fuchs Mizrahi School and vice president of the Jewish Education Center of Cleveland.

Jeff and Danielle, 20-year residents of Beachwood, are parents of Joshua, 20; Zachary, 18; and Aidan, 16.

"Beachwood has always been a warm and generous community," Jeff says. "And I'm confident, through a united commitment to the Federation's Campaign for Jewish Needs, that Northeast Ohio will continue to be a great place to call home for my children and my grandchildren in the future."

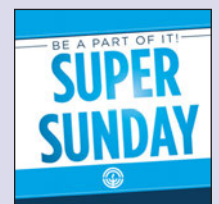

Friends Fill Mini Gardens With Earthly Delights by June Scharf

Creative expression comes in many forms, and for two Beachwood residents, it currently involves inventive planters and fairy gardens. In their minds, anything could be a potential planter or subject matter for a mini garden.

“Both are fun to look at and they’re cute conversation pieces,” says Cheryl Scharf. And why shouldn’t she grow a flower in an old pink tennis shoe? With a real passion for the color, she has plenty of additional pink planters distributed around her large backyard deck, all of which bring her great pleasure.

The other source of dirty delight comes in the form of fairy gardens. The concept first germinated when her neighbor and fellow art-project lover, Linda Gottfried, saw them in Claremont, California. The formula involves taking mini objects and arranging them in a scene, along with mini plants.

Cheryl’s imagination ran wild

with one example, from which she created for her husband Andy as a Father’s Day gift.

Because he loves the TV show, *The Goldbergs*, she replicated some of the show’s content with a frequently seen house, chair, and other tchotchkes.

To add further personalization to the project, she used as the planter a drum turned upside down because Andy plays drums in a band. She also added stickers drawn from commonly used phrases on the show.

But her “pride and joy” is the in-ground mini putting green in her front yard. It features a fairway and club house, and plays on her love for the game of golf.

The 17-year-long neighbors buy their special mini plants from the Village Herb Shop in Chagrin Falls where classes are offered on the craft. They were also very excited to discover a location that takes fairy gardens to the next level: Mulberry Creek Herb Farm in Huron, Ohio, where “it’s like a mini town because so many are growing there,” reports Linda. They sell mini-plants and other gardening supplies, too.

Both women are extremely fond of art projects, and the novelty factor associated with them generates much of the fun. They expect to be done with gardening by the end of summer, and be on to something new in the fall.

Other crafts they’ve dabbled

with include: needle felting, perfumes made with essential oils, cookie decorating, rock painting, knitting/crocheting/sewing; and making greeting cards, jewelry, and silk scarves.

“We’ll try just about any art project,” says Gottfried, who also has a long creative history with crafts. “I loved art as a kid,” she notes.

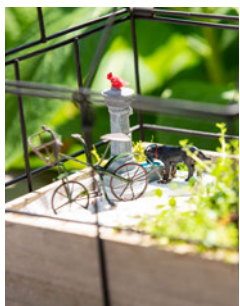
When they’re not crafting, Linda sells museum storage equipment for collections. Cheryl works for Little Racquets, a tennis instruction program for elementary-age students. She also works for an attorney part-time.

- **Work to improve our infrastructure, such as sidewalks, LED and additional lighting, further development of Park East, clearly identified bike paths and a plan for a new outdoor community gathering facility.**

Drivers seeing a stopped school bus with the stop arm out and lights flashing are to stop at least 10 feet from the front of or rear of the bus and not move until signaled to do so by the bus driver.

A driver does not need to stop for a school bus approaching from the opposite direction when traveling on a highway with four or more traffic lanes.

RECYCLE BASICS

Recycling contamination happens when well-intended recyclers mistakenly put the wrong items into their recycling. Recycling contamination is an issue across the nation and world but is also a problem in Cuyahoga County.

The best way to avoid recycling contamination is to recycle only these five core items:

- **CANS:** Empty and rinse.
- **CARTONS:** Empty and rinse. Replace the cap: it's too small to be recycled by itself!
- **GLASS BOTTLES & JARS:** Empty and rinse.
- **PAPER & BOXES:** Flatten cardboard items to save space.
- **PLASTIC BOTTLES & JUGS:** Empty and rinse. Replace the cap.

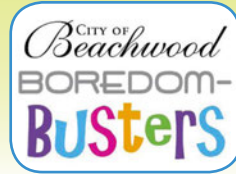

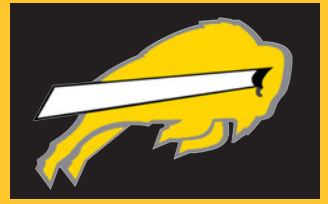

Maltz Museum Special Exhibition

Leonard Bernstein: The Power of Music

September 25, 2019 – March 1, 2020

The Maltz Museum of Jewish Heritage announces *Leonard Bernstein: The Power of Music*, the first large-scale museum exhibition to illustrate the famed conductor and composer's life, Jewish identity, and social activism. Created by the National Museum of American Jewish History (NMAJH) in Philadelphia to coincide with the maestro's 100th birthday, the exhibition features approximately 100 historic artifacts and photographs – from Bernstein's piano and conducting suit to family heirlooms – along with original films and immersive sound installations. *Leonard Bernstein: The Power of Music* is on view at the Maltz Museum from September 25, 2019 to March 1, 2020.

Audiences may be familiar with many of Bernstein's works, notably *West Side Story* (1957), but not necessarily how his approach to music was informed by the political and social crises of his day. Bernstein used the arts to express the restlessness, anxiety, fear, and hope of an American Jew living through World War II and the Holocaust, the Vietnam War, and turbulent social change that shook his faith: in God, in humanity, and in government.

The exhibition focuses on this theme in Bernstein's work – what he referred to as his “search for a solution to the 20th-century crisis of faith.” It explores how he confronted this “crisis” by breaking racial barriers in his casting decisions for *On the Town* (1944), how he addressed America's changing ideas about race and ethnicity in *West Side Story*, and how he gave a voice to the human

rights crisis during the Vietnam era in his provocative theater piece, *MASS* (1971), as examples.

Ivy Weingram, who curated the show for NMAJH, said, “Leonard Bernstein is remembered as a passionate, larger-than-life personality – a charismatic conductor, devoted educator, and skilled musician. This exhibition will delve into his memorable works while also exploring a lesser known side of Bernstein – the second-generation American Jew who inspired social progress, both on and off the stage. As our nation continues to confront issues of race, religion, and what it means to be an ‘American,’ Bernstein's music takes on new, personal meanings for every audience that experiences it.”

The exhibition brings together approximately 100 original artifacts and photographs, some never before exhibited in public. Artifact highlights include Bernstein's piano, an annotated copy of *Romeo and Juliet* used for the development of *West Side Story* (originally imagined as *East Side Story*), the program for his Carnegie Hall debut, his conducting suit, his easel used for studying scores and composing, and much more.

Bernstein's Jewish heritage, so deeply ingrained in him by his parents and so intricately woven through his life and work, is conveyed through a number of artifacts, including the mezuzah that hung in his studio, the Hebrew prayer book he carried with him when he traveled, his ketubah (Jewish marriage certificate), his family's Passover Seder plate, and the Talmud (book of Jewish law) given to Bernstein by his father.

The exhibition also features a variety of films, sound installations, and interactive media. Visitors will hear from Bernstein himself through archival recordings and documentary footage, alongside interviews with those who knew him best. Film clips of Bernstein conducting, his visit to Israel in 1967, and excerpts of West Side Story highlight key moments in Bernstein's life and career.

Through a state-of-the-art multimedia interactive exhibition, visitors are invited to explore the many layers to Bernstein's original compositions, including how he wove elements of synagogue music and his own family's history into his works for film, Broadway, and orchestra.

To communicate the significance of Bernstein's visit to a Displaced Persons camp in Germany during Spring 1948 – where he led an orchestra of Holocaust survivors – the Museum displays video testimonies, courtesy of USC Shoah Foundation, from those who participated in this little-known moment in Bernstein's life.

An original film conveys the enduring impact of Bernstein's *MASS*, re-contextualizing the monumental composition by combining it with contemporary examples of the power of music. Another original film features interviews with Bernstein mentees and fans, including Alec Baldwin (voice of the New York Philharmonic radio broadcasts), actor Mandy Patinkin, playwright Tony Kushner, and musician Wynton Marsalis.

SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL OFFERING

A special component to the museum's educational offerings includes a partnership with Roots of American Music (ROAM), inviting groups to add on to their exhibition tour with a "Bernstein Interactive Music Experience." Working with a ROAM teaching artist, students will learn about the power of music in protest and use one of Bernstein's songs to craft lyrics that address injustices they

The event will take place February 2, 2 pm, at Severance Hall.

Beverlee lived in Shaker Heights before moving to Stone Gardens. She has a son and four daughters. Although she was an interior designer, she never used fish in her designs!

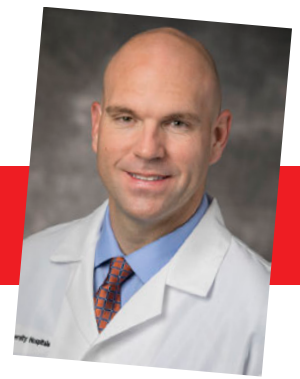

Nothing can ruin your day quicker than a sudden injury. A broken arm or a sprained ankle is a painful disruption to your life – requiring an unanticipated trip to the hospital, perhaps a long wait to be seen by a doctor – and is often followed by an unwelcome and expensive bill from the emergency room visit.

That's why University Hospitals has established the Orthopedic Injury Clinic, to help sidestep the ER in the case of an unexpected injury – and to provide immediate access to a team of orthopedic specialists the same day.

The new Orthopedic Injury Clinic at University Hospitals Ahuja Medical Center in Beachwood provides same-day and walk-in appointments, five days a week. The clinic is staffed by a team of orthopedic specialists, who will be on hand to examine, diagnose and treat your injury. Some of the most common injuries treated at the Orthopedic Injury Clinic include foot and ankle injuries, knee injuries, dislocations and fractures.

According to Benjamin Boswell, DO, a UH sports medicine physician and assistant medical physician for the Cleveland Browns, seeing an orthopedic specialist right away after an injury has a big advantage over seeing a physician in the emergency department.

"The providers at the Orthopedic Injury Clinic will be trained with a stronger focus on musculoskeletal and sports medicine injuries," Dr.

Boswell said. "Furthermore, if a patient requires long-term specialist management, they will be placed directly into an appointment with that specialist. That way they can skip the step of a long wait in the emergency department."

Dr. Boswell says that walk-in patients are typically seen within 60 minutes of their arrival at the Orthopedic Injury Clinic, and the average time spent from arrival to discharge is 90 minutes, depending on the extent of the injury. Patients can also call ahead to schedule an appointment up to 24 hours in advance.

Upon your arrival at the clinic, an orthopedic specialist will be able to accurately and quickly assess the extent of the injury and pinpoint a diagnosis using state-of-the-art imaging equipment. The physician can then develop a treatment plan using his or her knowledge and training about injuries to the bones, joints, ligaments, and tendons.

A patient can also immediately be scheduled for surgery if the injury warrants it. The Orthopedic Injury Clinic streamlines this process, so the patient can often have surgery scheduled within 24 hours.

This prompt assessment and treatment of an injury can help assist in a speedier healing time and recovery.

"At University Hospitals, we have excellent orthopedics and sports medicine specialists that cover all aspects of orthopedic care," said Dr. Boswell. The Injury Clinic allows for patients to have direct access to these providers without having to first seek care at local urgent cares or emergency departments. This will help patients receive overall improved care for their acute injuries."

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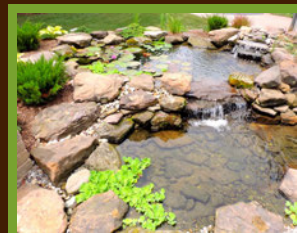
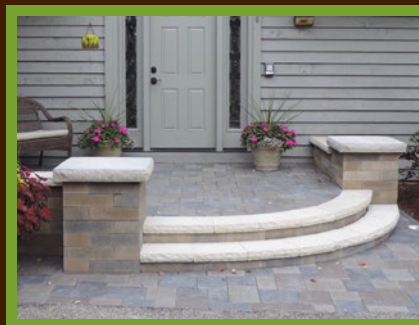
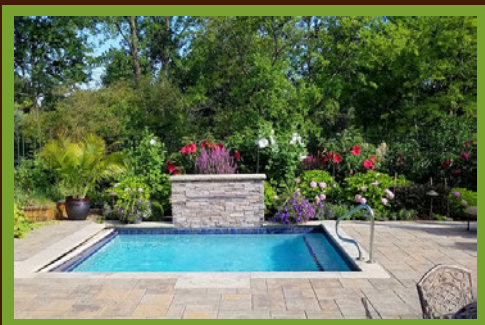
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Beachwood Schools Partner with Cleveland Kids' Book Bank

Beachwood High School hosts an outdoor book collection bin for gently used children's books to be distributed to disadvantaged children in Greater Cleveland

Gently used children's books that might have gone in the trash will now have a second life thanks to Beachwood's new partnership with the Cleveland Kids' Book Bank.

The Kids' Book Bank has provided Beachwood High School with a large steel bin for the collection of children's books. "We are so grateful to Angela Maxwell, school librarian, who jumped on board with this idea without hesitation. We know there are great kids' books in the suburbs looking for a second life, and we're excited to partner with Beachwood schools to get them to kids who need them," said Judy Payne, co-founder and executive director of the Cleveland Kids' Book Bank.

Beachwood High School hosts the bin; the community donates gently used children's books; and

school clubs and groups empty the bins, box the books, and deliver them to the Kids' Book Bank, which distributes them to disadvantaged kids through its network of more than 1,000 partner organizations.

The bin is at Beachwood High School in the parking lot by the recycling bin and will remain there permanently.

"Our goal is to collect from our community bins at least 50% of the books we distribute," said Payne. "We distribute between 60,000-65,000 a month through our community partners."

Why Books Matter

- Studies show that being read to as a child and having books in the home are the two most important indicators of future academic success.

- Two-thirds of low-income families do not own a single children's book.
- Early access to books is critical, and the Kids' Book Bank gets books into the hands of children through various sources.

About the Cleveland Kids' Book Bank

Founded in late 2015 as an outgrowth of the Little Free Library movement in Cleveland, the Kids' Book Bank opened its doors in February 2016 to receive, manage, and distribute truckloads of books every month—books that would otherwise go into the landfill.

The mission of the Kids' Book Bank is to foster improved literacy and a love of reading by providing free books to children in need. The goal is to break the poverty

cycle by exposing disadvantaged children to language and reading from birth—fostering literacy skills, opening their minds to the world beyond their neighborhood, and fueling their imaginations.

Volunteers fuel their operation and more than 6,000 people have sorted, packed, and boxed books at their MidTown Cleveland warehouse.

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Bringing the Courtroom to the Palm of your Hands – Judge Francine Goldberg helps create CourtConnect Mobile App



On August 8, the Court officially announced the creation of CourtConnect, which is available for iOS and Android devices. “CourtConnect is bringing our courtrooms to the palm of your hands. Through this technology and innovation, we’re helping families navigate the legal system and conserve their resources, while providing easy access to important information about their cases. CourtConnect is the first app that gives Cuyahoga County families, instant, 24-7 access to their cases,” said Judge Goldberg.

Judge Goldberg is a 1982 Beachwood High School graduate and was inducted into the BHS Gallery of Success in 2009. She is a former Cuyahoga County assistant prosecuting attorney and director of the Ohio Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force, where she also developed an app to help parents, school administrators, and law enforcement officers fight online crimes.

Judge Goldberg saw technology as an area that would make the experience of navigating a Domestic Relations Court case more convenient and less stressful. She was motivated to develop CourtConnect because of two major issues in Domestic Relations Court – the high number of self-represented litigants and the inability for individuals to pay child support in the courtroom.

Judge Francine Goldberg is in the spotlight for initiating change in Cuyahoga County Domestic Relations Court by spearheading the development of CourtConnect – a free mobile app that provides the public with quick, easy, on-the-go access to court-related information.

“The Court has seen an increase in self-represented litigants – a trend which is expected to increase in the future,” Judge Goldberg said. Self-represented litigants receive assistance in the Court’s Help Center, which provides resources for parties who don’t have lawyers. However, Help Center staff are not permitted to give legal advice or strategy.

“I think this is a game changer. It provides self-represented litigants with a simple, easy method to obtain important information about the current status of their case and to make payments – whether child support or court costs. You just download the app and log in.”

“Approximately 60% of our cases involve at least one self-represented party,” Judge Goldberg added. The Help Center, officially launched in May 2017, consists of a full-time, licensed attorney and four help-center specialists who offer both walk-in and telephone assistance. It is equipped with four computers and printers. Help Center staff provides assistance to

self-represented litigants with divorce, dissolution, child custody, child support, and post-decree proceedings. As a result the number of delayed cases due to inaccurate or incomplete paperwork are reduced. To date, the Center has assisted 20,817 in-person visitors; and in 2018, averaged 27.6 phone calls per day.

“If I can buy a cup of coffee and pay for it with an iPad, why can’t judges enforce child support orders in the same fashion?” Judge Goldberg said. “I felt there was an easier way through technology for the court to do business that was quick, easy, and convenient for our families.”

CourtConnect levels the playing field. It provides self-represented litigants and lawyers intuitive, 24/7, on-the-go access to court-related information through mobile devices.

This cutting-edge technology is the first of its kind for a domestic relations court in Ohio, and possibly the first in the United States. “Hopefully our prototype will be used in other courts throughout Ohio and the country,” Judge Goldberg said. “I think this is a game changer. It provides self-represented litigants with a simple, easy method to obtain important information about the current status of their case and to make payments – whether child support or court costs. You just download the app and log in.”

There are two ways to login to CourtConnect: through an email address or with an e-file account. Both methods will allow users to flag cases, receive push notifications regarding court dates and docket updates, and learn what is happening with their cases in real time. An e-filing account also allows users to view docket images in real time.

“This is a new way for our Court to do business,” Judge Goldberg said. “This cutting-edge technology is interactive, innovative and user friendly. It is exciting for our Court to be in the forefront of this innovative electronic application. We want to reach a point where we are a paperless court. I hope that litigants and attorneys create e-file accounts, which will increase efficiencies and enhance transparency in our judicial system.”

This is the first version of CourtConnect. Judge Goldberg and her team welcomes feedback from everyone who uses it so they can build on the technology and make it better.

“CourtConnect puts the courtroom in the palm of your hands, providing attorneys, self-represented litigants, and families with instant access to navigate our complex legal system.”

ORT America – Ohio Region is participating in a Challenge Grant set up by a donor in London that will unlock \$4 million in funding for the much-needed renovations of the kitchen and dining hall at the Kfar Silver Youth Village in Israel.

If ORT donors around the country raise \$1 million in new and increased gifts by October 31, the donor will provide \$4 million to help fund the project. The Ohio Region has committed to raising \$100,000 by the deadline. ORT donations, as well as proceeds from the organization's Jurisprudence Awards in June and the upcoming 48th Annual ORT Brunch, will go toward that goal.

ORT Ohio established a relationship with the students and staff at Kfar Silver three years ago, when it began raising funds for the renovation of the school's 60-year-old science building. Having completed that project at the end of last year, the region leadership was eager to continue making much-needed improvements at Kfar Silver. Shortly after committing to support the renovations of the kitchen, the challenge grant was announced.

"For many of the students, Kfar Silver is their only home," explained Greg Marcus, president of the Ohio Region of ORT America, who visited the youth village earlier this year. "Many of these students struggle with mental health challenges, poverty, or families who are unable to care for them. Kfar Silver provides a high-level of education and social support to Israel's most at-risk students, ensuring that they receive necessary support to reach their full potential."

Kfar Silver Youth Village was founded 60 years ago in Southern Israel by the Zionist Organization of America to serve as an educational and agricultural

home for children who had just made Aliyah (moved to Israel) and those who were still arriving from other countries around the world after the establishment of the State of Israel. The location was chosen in order to fulfill the Zionist dream of making the Negev bloom.

In 2016, Kfar Silver joined the World ORT Kadima Mada (Science Journey) educational network in Israel. Unlike the other schools and youth villages managed by World ORT Kadima Mada, ORT is responsible for the entire management of Kfar Silver, including the school, the boarding school and the agricultural farm.

ORT's current priority is to ensure that all Kfar Silver students have a modern, updated and safe space in which to live, eat and study. For these students, the kitchen and dining hall complex are the heart of Kfar Silver. In its current state, however, the kitchen and dining hall are barely fit to serve the students.

"Kfar Silver urgently needs to increase the size and efficiency

of both the kitchen and dining hall," Marcus said. "This is an old structure that ORT took over just a few years ago. It needs immediate renovations in order to serve more students and staff in a safe, modern and updated environment that can produce more than 1,000 meals per day. Immediate action is needed to keep the facilities up to code."

Kfar Silver Youth Village, named after long-time Cleveland Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, empowers underserved students to reach their full potential. Each day this rural boarding school serves approximately 400 day students and 220 boarders between 12 and 18 years old. The 60-acre campus is located on 370 acres of mainly agricultural land on the outskirts of the town of Ashkelon, near the border with Gaza. Day students and boarders study together and all participate in school, youth village, and farming activities. But in its current state, the kitchen and dining hall are barely fit to serve the students.

"This is a very special place," said Mark Adler, ORT Ohio's vice president who visited the school a year ago. "Many of the students struggle with immense difficulties, including mental health challenges, poverty, or parents who are unable to care for them. Yet, with our help, they are thriving."

Approximately one third of Kfar Silver students are boarders, and of these, almost three quarters are either new immigrants or from immigrant families (primarily

from Ethiopia or the former Soviet Union). A small number of Negev Bedouins (7) also live there. The other boarders are at-risk youth from all over the country who have been referred to Kfar Silver as a chance to escape dysfunctional family backgrounds.

Eighty-seven students recently arrived in Israel without their parents, and the youth village is their only home. These students take part in the venerated Naale program, designed to ensure successful integration into school with classes taught in students' native languages.

Kfar Silver Youth Village provides a high-level of education and social support to Israel's most at-risk students—ensuring that they receive the necessary support to reach their full potential. "We are very happy to continue the relationship with the students and staff at Kfar Silver," Marcus added. "We're showing the important work we can do when the community stands behind a central project."

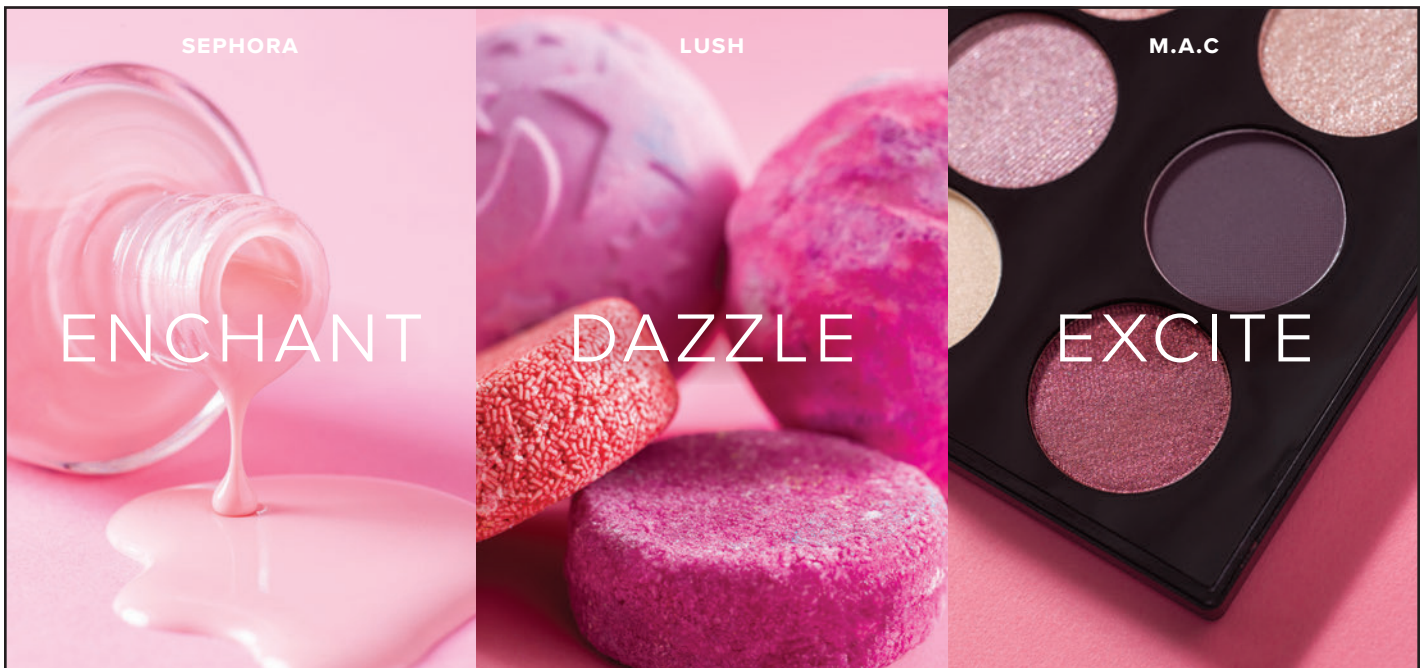

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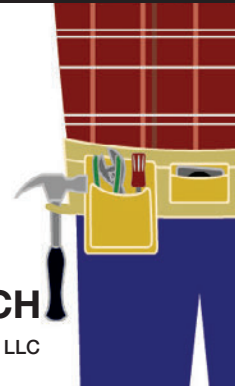
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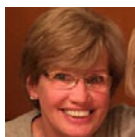
