Several months ago, Women of Fairmount Temple asked me to share my story about how I created and built *Beachwood Buzz*. The word "sure" rolled off my tongue a little too easily. Then, reality sunk in. I'm not comfortable with public speaking, and I found the idea of talking for 20 minutes to be daunting. Accepting this challenge was out of my comfort zone, yet I followed through, created a plan, and I was the group's guest speaker on January 7.

One word that consistently stands above all others in my life is "gratitude." I use it as a foundation in both my personal and business worlds, and I built my presentation upon it. This month, I'm pleased to share my story with you.

Frade School

I have enjoyed creating art ever since grade school. I remember painting, drawing, and creating collages. I was in my zone whenever there was a box of crayons nearby, and I thought I would continue along that path.

Rethink

In 1976, as a high school junior, it was time to consider college and majoring in art. I was very fortunate to have had a four-year free ride through college, but my parents wouldn't approve of a major in art. They felt I should major in something that would be more marketable, so I chose business at the University of Cincinnati – first in accounting, then as a double major in accounting and marketing, and then marketing.

After College

Marketing is a pretty broad major and I didn't know how to proceed. When you major in accounting, one may become an accountant. In engineering, an engineer; architecture, an architect. My parents owned Satellite Employment, so I worked temporary jobs and as an employment counselor. I then worked in a few sales and administrative positions. Once my children were born, I became a stay-at-home mom.

Two years later, Beachwood Buzz was taking too much time away from Andy's full-time position and he had no choice but to back out. I then had a choice to make – to call it quits or continue on my own. I followed my intuition and chose the latter. I enjoyed creating the magazine, I could work from home, and I believed that Beachwood Buzz filled a void in our community. I also knew that its potential was greater than what it was in those infancy years, so I created a plan.

The City of Beachwood had been producing a quarterly, four-page newsletter that was sent out to businesses and residents, and I knew that I could publish city information in a more cost-effective manner and distribute it to the community on a more regular basis, so I created a proposal that City Council supported. 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Male and female heart attack symptoms: What's the difference?

"Heart attack symptoms can vary by gender, but some symptoms are similar for both," says Matthew Kaminski, MD, a cardiologist at Cleveland Clinic Beachwood Family Health and Surgery Center.

Dr. Kaminski notes these common male and female heart attack symptoms:

- Chest pain
- Sweating/cold sweats
- Fullness, indigestion or a choking feeling
- Light-headedness or dizziness
- Rapid or irregular heartbeat

Men often have heart attacks at a younger age and more frequently than women. While chest pain is the most common symptom for all people and should never be ignored, women can have other symptoms as well.

Unusual symptoms for women include:

- New or dramatic fatigue
- Shortness of breath
- Neck, back or jaw pain
- Nausea/vomiting



"More than 90% of women have at least one risk factor for heart disease. It's important to talk to your doctor so these can be identified and addressed," says Dina Sparano, MD, a cardiac electrophysiologist at Cleveland Clinic Hillcrest Hospital.

Dr. Sparano also stresses the importance of learning basic CPR. "Cardiac arrest is often the first presentation of heart disease. CPR could save the life of someone close to you one day."

If you believe that you may be having a heart attack, call 911 immediately.

A Marriage Story Rooted in childhood, J lasting a lifetime

Doctors Gretta and Michael Jacobs have accomplished one of the more elusive and uncommon practices of marriage... a blissful, lifelong relationship.

Their marriage story has its roots in Johannesburg, South Africa, where their educational paths continually crossed. They met in preschool at age three, and both skipped first grade because of their exceptional intelligence. They were sent to different elementary schools, but ended up together for the last two years. They attended different high schools, but their paths again realigned when they pursued their medical educations at the same university, at age 16. In South Africa, students enter medical school straight out of high school.

"I tried to avoid him as best I could," says Gretta with a twinkle in her eye. "I was interested in the taller guys at med school."

She knew, however, that Michael took outstanding notes, so they studied together. They had been friends for years previously, and their families were connected through regular card games between Michael's grandmother and Gretta's mother.

interests and become full role players in some esoteric and mildly eccentric endeavors.

For example, when Michael was growing up, his hobby was breeding pedigreed Persian cats, which he imported from Holland and England. At one point, when he had 27 felines at home and he needed to build housing for them outside in the mild climate, Gretta became his co-conspirator. This is how she first got to really know Michael, but it came at a price – she was terribly allergic to cats. "It's a testament to how I felt about him that I suffered from sneezing for days, but I persevered and became used to the cats after a few years."

They both adored their pets and still have a photo of their cream-colored grand champion hanging in their Beachwood home.

The couple became engaged at age 22 and married at 23 (their birthdays are precisely one month apart). A measure of their relationship's alchemy seems to lie in how they strike a solid balance between their common and contrasting interests. And their consummate respect for each other is added to the mix. They support each other unequivocally. This formula has been working for 47 years.

"He's the sanest person I know," Gretta remarks from their recently purchased and completely remodeled Beachwood ranch home. "He a rock; he's always there. Even though he says the most outlandish things sometimes, he's very kind and his heart is the best." She also believes their temperaments are very well matched.

"We always support what the other one is doing," he adds. "We are both the 'boss,' but one of us has a 'y' at the end!"

Nonetheless, she notes that, "He has the weirdest sense of humor and sometimes mocks me!"

They would agree that theirs is the kind of love that bends and flexes and doesn't take life too seriously.

Their medical careers were never in conflict either, she reports. "I'm as proud of him as can be."

She also states that Michael is very artistic and creative. These traits expressed themselves in the kitchen (a pseudo chemistry lab!). When their children were young, they would bake a birthday cake with

20 eggs and Michael carved a castle with a moat out of it. He also did all the decorating and frosting.

It was never a predictable path that they would be united in marriage.

"We were buddies, but I didn't think I'd marry him. I wasn't seeking a husband – that was the last thing I was looking for because I was in medical school."

Michael, however, has the handling of Gretta down to a science. And he appreciates how she puts up with him, adding, "She's a good person." As a pillar of mental and emotional stability, he appears amused by the way Gretta approaches all the vicissitudes that life has to offer – including four cranky teenagers, all present at the dinner table long ago. They were the catalyst for the enforcement of Gretta's DNA rule: Do Not Argue.

"Each child had a different opinion on everything," she recalls.

She was occasionally on her own with the children when Michael traveled globally to deliver lectures. Those were challenging times, she recalls.

Their two oldest children, born in South Africa, are heavily involved in science now. Erica earned a PhD. in biochemistry and works at Rockefeller University in New York where she studies protein complexes with a particular interest in host-pathogen interactions.

Kevin is a genetic epidemiologist, with an interest in cancer genetics. He has worked for the NIH and several genetic testing companies, and is highly published. He lives in Ann Arbor with his wife, Sarah, and their canine and feline menageries.

The two younger children were born in the U.S. Paul is a medical-imaging expert who works and lives in Beachwood with his wife, Alexandra, and their children, Max, Sam, and Sally. They receive generous amounts of babysitting from Gretta and Michael. David, their youngest, is a mechanical engineer who lives in Philadelphia with his wife, Crystal, and son, Miles.

In 1979, several years after medical school graduation, Gretta and Michael immigrated to Cleveland and continued their careers in medicine at University Hospitals and Case Western Reserve University. They share an

interest in pathology, and Gretta's practice was in surgical pathology whereas Michael's was in clinical microbiology.

Michael became the medical director of Clinical Microbiology and was a professor of pathology, with a career lasting 40 years, from which he retired in 2019. He now works one day a week at the same institutions.

Gretta became the head of Renal, Liver and Transplant Pathology and an associate professor

at the same university and hospital system. After 34 years of practice, she retired in 2013.

Their lives together have been guided largely by their careers, but also by their niche interests. One of them is a passion for opera – they attended more than 100 international performances that featured their favorite lyric tenor, Raul Gimenez.

Reading historical fiction is one of Michael's long-held interests. But with these two intellectuals, the challenge is intensified by often reading their fiction in Spanish – they take lessons every Saturday. And the length of some books could reach 900 pages. Cases in point: the Harry Potter series, and books by Ildefonso Falcones and Maria Dueñas.

Aside from all the mental activity, they enjoy walking about five miles every day around the neighborhood together. They also take water aerobics classes at the JCC. In the nice weather, they spend time gardening in their backyard, which they recently redesigned, replanted and enlarged. It was featured in *Beachwood Buzz* last year.

The genesis for some of their other activities can be traced to the moment when Gretta is taken with a thought and gleefully says to Michael: "I have an idea...," to which he patiently listens. And he always supports her latest, greatest interest. Over the past few years, one of those was painting. "If it doesn't move, I'll paint it!" she states. She also crocheted about 20 blankets last winter for all her family members.

Renovating their home is a more recent joint project, with changes made throughout their 1,800 square foot, 60-year-old residence, including vaulting most of the ceilings. They previously lived in a large home in Moreland Hills until 2015 when they wanted to downsize and live closer to their son's family in Beachwood.

"We walked in to see this property and our realtor said, 'This is not the house for you!'We said, it's perfect!"

Much like this house that they lovingly transformed into a home, they nurtured a relationship that has withstood time and trials. It's a solid testament to what's possible when two hearts and minds find mutual fulfillment.

- Just be good to each other
- Don't be competitive and strive to outdo each other
- Consider yourselves a team, as in "I'm for him/ her and he's/she's for me"
- If something is meant to be, it's meant to be
- Having a lot in common helps
- Fighting:

Gretta – "We used to fight early on, and I came to the conclusion that so many things are not that important. To get your way or to get an acknowledgement that you're right, it's not worth it. People fight over the stupidest things. I usually swallow my pride. I'd say that he's right 100% of the time, too."

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February Buzz from State Representative Kent Smith

appy February, *Beachwood Buzz* readers! During the first days of 2020, I attended the swearing in ceremonies in Beachwood, Euclid, Richmond Heights and Woodmere Village. Those ceremonies launched the transition from past campaigning to new partnerships in governance for 2020. To new and returning mayors and council members, I say: treat your colleagues with respect

and find opportunities for cooperation that will advance positive outcomes in your cities.

With that in mind, let me raise two subjects that are both critical and coming up fast:

- 1. The March 17 Primary Election.
- **2.** The 2020 United States Census, which is next month's topic.

First thing's first—you must be registered to vote by February 18 to participate in the March 17 Primary Election. If you're not registered, you can't vote. Whether you think you're registered or you're not sure, check on the County Board of Elections website. DO THAT NOW, before February 18.

It is important for everyone reading this to proactively exercise your voting rights. If you fail to use them – you may lose them.

Think I'm kidding? The Ohio Secretary of State began removing inactive voters this past fall. In Cuyahoga County, 33,868 voters were removed from the valid voter database and 3,312 from this District (including Beachwood) lost their ability to vote.

So, during the month of February, let's start a

conversation about voting and cover these three things:

- If you want to be able to vote for president in November, make sure you vote in March.
- 2. The deadline to register to vote in the March Primary is February 18.
- 3. The Primary is on March 17 this year (*That's right*! *St. Patrick's Day!*). The state has departed from the "first Tuesday of the month" tradition for the 2020 Primary. People will miss it unless we remind them. So – don't get purged, Beachwood!

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


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Self-Love – The Best Love of All

As Sesame Street starts its 51st year, actors and Muppets – Big Bird, The Count, Cookie Monster, Grover, Ernie and Bert, Kermit, Miss Piggy, etc. – continue to honor the show's original vision of bringing children into a world of inclusiveness, tolerance, curiosity, and kindness with a

growth mindset and focus on learning.

There are more than 150 versions of Sesame Street, produced in 70 languages. It was created for children to learn letters and numbers, but accomplishes so much more. Its diverse cast of actors and Muppets use humor, compassion, and creativity to teach children how to explore and manage difficult feelings, challenging situations, and perhaps most important, how to be a good friend and neighbor. The show never avoids challenging topics, such as divorce, grief, community violence, conflict resolution, coping with incarceration, family homelssness, foster care, handling emergencies, illness, living with disabilities, understanding mental illness, differences, insecurities, or challenges.

Sesame Street is a place that, no matter who you are, where you come from, what you look like, or the challenges you are facing in life, you are welcome.

Sesame Street's emphasis is always on resilience, compassion, and being emotionally and physically healthy. These lessons are communicated through modeling, repetition, and humor that is age appropriate, accessible, honest, and relevant.

Dignitaries, politicians, actors, singers, authors, and poets stop by Sesame Street, a show that continues to engage children in becoming smarter, stronger, and kinder. The timeless and impactful lessons learned on Sesame Street are ones that children and adults alike can choose to emulate in order to be good friends and neighbors, and to help make our world kinder and smarter.

"The IAJGS annual conference was announced for Cleveland and I was inspired," Deborah says. "Would there be any interest in a larger family reunion around the conference and





Never underestimate the resourcefulness of scammers. Some drive around neighborhoods during the day, looking for older adults working in the yard or getting their mail. They make a note of addresses, return, and try to sell the seniors on unnecessary repairs. Please sit down with your senior loved ones and calmly talk about scammers.

- Availability: Seniors are seen as targets because they are retired, less mobile, and at home for the calls.
- Isolation: Seniors are often alone because families move away and sometimes have little or no interaction with loved ones.
- Loneliness: Because of their isolation, seniors' friendships often can be limited, and this can make them vulnerable to a friendly cold caller. Some scams are even perpetrated by seemingly trusted people who work to build friendships and then prey on vulnerabilities.
- Sickness: Chronic health issues mean that many older adults have difficulty maintaining their property.
 Scam artists know that.
 Unscrupulous workers can bilk seniors out of thousands of dollars for a job that should only cost hundreds of dollars.
- Prosperity: Money is one of the most notable reasons for senior vulnerability.
 Scammers see them as a supply of wealth that includes homes, property, life savings, and other assets.

Free Health Clinic Open to All

ant to take better care of yourself but you don't have insurance or are underinsured? Then put the upcoming Free Health Clinic on your calendar.

Thanks to the vision of David M. Rosenberg, MD, of the UH Ahuja Lung Center, in collaboration with Medworks, MetroHealth, and Jewish Family Service (JFSA), people who want to stay healthy will have a chance to do so – regardless of their ability to pay.

Attendees will have free access to clinical services provided by clinician volunteers from University Hospitals, MetroHealth, Cleveland Clinic, and Lake County Health Systems, as well as by independent practitioners.

The Free Health Clinic will be held at MetroHealth Cleveland Heights Medical Center, 10 Severance Circle, Cleveland Heights from 8-1 on Saturday, February 29, and from 11-3 on Sunday, March 1.

"Health screenings, like the ones being offered at the free clinic, are designed to detect early disease, which at that point can potentially be cured or future complications prevented," said Dr. Rosenberg. "That's one reason why we hope people of all ages will attend. We can take care of everyone who walks through the door."

Among the services offered at the clinic are: mammograms, vision care, foot care, blood pressure, nutritional consultation, and skin cancer screening. There will be internal and family medicine specialists, pediatricians, and practitioners in the area of women's health.

Medworks, which has held more than 60 free medical,

dental and vision clinics in Northeast Ohio, helped plan the event, generate funding to support the clinic and engage its network of medical and support volunteers to offer free care.

MetroHealth is providing space for the clinic at its Cleveland Heights facility, as well as clinical support, pharmacy services, and a free van to bring people to appointments.

JFSA will supply non-clinician volunteers to staff the clinic, help with social service issues that arise, and make available behavioral health providers.

"Along with delivering health care, our ultimate goal is to keep people healthy for the long run," said Dr. Rosenberg. "If an attendee is discovered to have a medical issue that needs monitoring or follow-up care, this will be arranged by the clinic's staff."

Dr. Rosenberg is pleased that Rabbi Avroham Adler from Gesher and the Chesed Center, as well as Moish Tohn of Klein Family Charities, have encouraged members of the Orthodox community to attend the Sunday clinic.

"Rabbi Adler sent letters to the community telling them about the free clinic, and we hope many will take advantage of all we have to offer," said Dr. Rosenberg. "We'll have everything in place for a successful clinic. I encourage people to spread the word."



Hidden in Plain Sight: Domestic Violence in the Jewish Community will be explored by experts in the field on Wednesday, February 19, at Jewish Family Service Association, 29125 Chagrin Blvd., Pepper Pike, 7 pm. 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

To protect you and your loved ones against IRS scams, Better Business Bureau has these tips:

- The IRS always mails a bill, then follows up with a phone call. They will never demand immediate payment over the phone. Similarly, the IRS doesn't threaten to involve local law enforcement, and the IRS cannot revoke your driver's or business licenses or immigration status. Don't trust your caller ID.
- Ask About Payment Method. Remember, gift cards are for gifts. Government or other agency officials will never demand payment in gift cards. The IRS also does not accept payment via wire transfer or prepaid debit card.
- The Internet has made it possible for scammers to use fake IDs when they call your home.



If you receive a suspicious call, don't make any important decisions based on what your caller ID says. Avoid answering calls from phone numbers you don't recognize, even if they appear to be local. If it's

important, the caller will leave a message.

Though now in effect, enforcement is being delayed until July 1 to make the transition easier for everyone. Plastic bags harm our health and quality of life. The ban is being put into effect to protect Lake Erie, rivers, parks, and natural resources. Each year, more than 300 million bags are discarded in Cuyahoga County alone, and drinking water treatment plants cannot filter them out of the system. Also, water and sewer systems run more smoothly without plastic bags clogging storm drains and discharging into our lakes, streams and creeks.

Bag bans work. They have been in effect in China for more than a decade, and Ireland for 17 years. In Chicago, bag usage dropped by more than 50 percent in the first month of its program. Currently, 127 countries and 349 jurisdictions have regulations on plastic bags.



According to the EPA, 102 billion plastic bags are used and discarded in the U.S. every year. We can help reduce this tremendous pollution waste.



IN THE CITY SPOTLIGHT Meet Bruno Zovko

t age 29 when Bruno Zovko received a phone call from a friend telling him that they were hiring at the Beachwood Service Department, Bruno jumped on it. He had heard of Beachwood's reputation as a great place to work and wanted to lay a foundation on which to build a career. For the past 20 years, that's what he's done.

Bruno was hired in an entrylevel position, starting with rubbish pick-up. He has since learned the ins and outs of all that is behind the scenes to keep the City of Beachwood functional and aesthetically beautiful. Bruno worked in landscape, and most recently, construction, where he has been a crew leader since 2014. His main duties are sidewalk maintenance, road sewer repair, and in the winter, snow plowing, which trumps all.

Beachwood is known for its clean streets, which is not coincidental. Bruno matches up a crew of 32 full-time laborers who cover two 12-hour shifts to staff 19 vehicles to have city streets salted and plowed when storms arrive.

"When snow is flying, I'm responsible," Bruno told us. "All full-time employees are on call when a storm is predicted – with six staff members on duty every night. During storms, all other work is put on the back burner.

"The city is divided into sections," he added. "We have 10 main-street sections and 9 sidestreet sections, so when I assign someone to Lower South End, he knows that it covers Halburton, Halworth, Cranby, Somerset, Stratton, Rexway, Farnsleigh, Old Green, and Belvoir roads.

"It's a challenge to coordinate the process," he continued. "All hands are on deck so we can clean the roads as quickly as possible."

All full-timers are licensed, with a CDL Class A License, to operate snow-removal equipment. "It is much more fun to clear the roads when there is no traffic," Bruno added.

Bruno also oversees snow removal on sidewalks. "With three bombardiers, it takes eight hours to cover the town."

Salting is the other component of keeping our roads clear. Beachwood has three salt domes in total that hold enough salt to enable us to keep our roads safe and clear.

Plowing isn't just a winter job. Bruno explained how the plows are serviced from mid-summer by in-house mechanics to make sure they are in good condition when the season hits. And, if plows break down during the winter season, mechanics prioritize their repairs.

Bruno's position involves shuffling employees to complete tasks. He is grateful for his team, each of whom brings their own skillset. "During winter months, in addition to plowing, we work mostly on road repairs, water line breaks, and keeping sewers clear."

Favorite parts of working for the city?

The people I work with. Everyone is professional. We have more than 20 people on our team and very low turnover. We know each other as people, not just fellow employees. We know about each other's families and interests outside of work. We've always had mutually respectful relationships, so going from crew member to leader was an easy transition.

What are your interests outside of work?

Golf. In fact, we host a golf outing every year in memory of George Mangano, a former employee. We raise money and donate it to the Geauga Humane Society.

What is your hardest task?

Managing personalities. When personalities clash, I may pair people together so they hug it out and support each other. I work to keep morale up, which makes our whole department stronger.

Anything else?

For the past six years, I've served as a union assistant

steward, helping to negotiate contracts for laborers.

Beachwood's reputation is the same today as it was when I was hired. We go above and beyond to help residents, and the number of complimentary calls we receive confirms that residents appreciate all we do. It's a testament to Beachwood when part-timers leave to obtain full-time employment, and come back when full-time openings are available.

I treat this like my second family. We are all here for each other – both in and outside of work. We show up for each other, which makes it pleasant to come to work each day.

UH Ahuja Medical Center – Phase 2 Expansion

niversity Hospitals Ahuja Medical Center is bringing new healthcare services and approximately 1,000 new jobs to the community through the addition of a new 215,495 square-foot three-story hospital building and a two-story, 78,185-square-foot sports medicine complex. Staying consistent with UH's goal of keeping patients healthy with preventive care and reducing in-hospital stays, much of the construction will support outpatient services.

"Our Ahuja Phase 2 project addresses patient needs in Northeast Ohio by giving them access to high-quality health care," said UH Ahuja Medical Center President Alan Papa, FACHE. "Our growth will extend our existing services to enhance patient experience, and simultaneously give us a platform to launch new services on campus, so we can continue to be a healthcare hub for the community."

Ahuja Phase 2 will feature a multitude of new and enhanced services:

- The launch of mother and baby services including new 9 labor and delivery rooms, 2 Cesarean Section, 23 Antepartum-Postpartum patient rooms, a 12 bed Level 3 neonatal intensive care unit, and 4 obstetrics triage rooms.
- Consolidation of comprehensive breast health center services including 12 exam rooms, 6 mammography units (all

featuring tomosynthesis), ultrasound, and stereotactic biopsy services.

- Expanded emergency services with over 60% more treatment spaces and 38 beds.
- A new ambulatory surgery center with 8 new operating rooms and 28 new patient preoperative and postoperative spaces.
- The largest sports medicine complex in Northeast
 Ohio that will include a performance center, 18 exam rooms, 4 exam rooms walk in clinic, 2 outpatient diagnostic and 14 exam rooms for rehabilitation space.
- An expanded observation unit with 23 private beds that will serve patients who can be treated and released the same day.
- Cutler Center for Men's
 Comprehensive Care will
 bring together key specialties

to motivate men to receive care throughout their lifetime including 16 exam rooms and 4 cystoscopy rooms.

- Expanded UH Harrington Heart & Vascular Institute with 11 new exam rooms.
- Expanded ambulatory medical imaging services with a new CT, radiology, 1.5T MRI, and ultrasound unit.

Initially, UH Ahuja Medical Center was envisioned as a multi-stage evolution in providing services for the community. Ahuja Phase 2 will feature similar characteristics as the buildings developed initially, including bright spaces, healthy food choices, healing gardens, and community wellness and health education spaces. Eco-friendly materials and processes will minimize energy costs and reduce building impact on the environment. In addition, the inpatient building is scalable, allowing for future growth of services through the addition of multiple floors.

The \$236 million project will be funded through bond financing and the generosity of donors. HKS Inc. are the architects for the project with Gilbane as General Contractor. The project will break ground this spring with a service launch to occur in mid-2022.

Heart Healthy Ways to Stay Upbeat

ebruary is National Heart Month, and is the perfect time to invest in your cardiovascular
 health. In addition to regular checkups with your healthcare provider, there are a number of ways to ensure your heart stays happy and upbeat:

Smoking Cessation:

The American Heart Association says diseases caused by smoking kill more than 440,000 people in the U.S. each year, and one of every 5 smoking-related deaths is caused by heart disease. Smokers have a higher risk for heart disease, stroke and vascular disease. Smoking changes the heart and blood vessels in a number of ways: It causes an instant and long-term rise in blood pressure and heart rate, reduces blood flow from the heart and to the brain, reduces the amount of oxygen that reaches the body's tissues, and raises risk for blood clots.

• Healthy Diet:

Eating well can help prevent a number of problems such as high cholesterol and heart disease. But knowing exactly what a healthy diet looks like can be a challenge. The key is to balance the five main food groups: grains, vegetables, fruits, dairy and protein. In addition to your healthcare provider, organizations and tools like ChooseMyPlate.gov can help you navigate emphasizing the correct amount of each food group. To lose weight and keep it off for a lifetime, begin thinking about an individualized eating plan. A plan tailored to your personal likes and dislikes will have a better chance of producing sustainable weight loss.

Plenty of Exercise:

If you are physically active, you are less likely to get heart disease and related problems such as high blood pressure, diabetes, and high cholesterol. Exercise not only lowers these risk factors, but helps to improve emotional well-being, reduce appetite, improve sleeping ability, improve flexibility, and lower LDL cholesterol (the bad cholesterol).

"I'm very excited about the team here at UH, says cardiologist and vascular medicine specialist at UH Ahuja Medical Center, Heather Gornik, MD. "In our vascular center we have a terrific interdisciplinary care team, with opportunities to work with our interventional specialists, our vascular surgeons, and our vascular medicine specialists. We all keep the best interest of the patient in mind in a really collaborative fashion."

Dr. Gornik, who is also co-director of the Vascular Center at UH Harrington Heart & Vascular Institute, and her team take care of patients who have heart disease, but also patients who have disease of the blood vessels. "I see everything from plaque, to blood clots, to rare disorders in terms of blood vessel conditions," she notes. "The most common disease of the blood vessels is atherosclerosis, or clogging of the arteries with plaque. I think I really love my specialty because I get to use everything from the low- to high-tech."

As an internationally recognized expert in the care of complex vascular diseases, Dr. Gornik collaborates with clinicians and investigators worldwide to advance the understanding of potentially morbid vascular disease. "About 10 years ago, I developed an interest in a rare arterial disease called fibromuscular dysplasia (FMD), which is a condition that affects mainly women, usually in the prime of life," she explains. You don't need travel far to receive exceptional cardiovascular care.

In addition to her work in FMD, Dr. Gornik is a nationally regarded expert in noninvasive vascular diagnostic testing. She has led the development of national guidelines related to the diagnosis and clinical care pathways for patients with vascular disease.

"Sometimes, by the time patients get to see me, I'm maybe the third or fourth opinion they've had," Dr. Gornik says. "So I think it's really important when we're dealing with serious cardiovascular diseases, and especially rare ones, to find out exactly what the patient knows and what they're yearning to learn more about."





Look for Changes in Retirement Plans

t might not have made the headlines, but a recently passed piece of legislation could affect the IRAs and 401(k)s of millions of Americans beginning in 2020. So, if you have one of these accounts or if you run a business, you'll want to learn more.

The new laws, collectively called the Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement (SECURE) Act, include these noteworthy changes:

Higher Age for RMDs

Under current law, you must start taking withdrawals, known as required minimum distributions (RMDs), from your traditional IRA and 401(k) or similar employersponsored plan once you turn 70 ½. The new law pushes the date to start RMDs to 72, which means you can hold on to your retirement savings a bit longer.

No Age Limit for Traditional IRA Contributions

Previously, you could only contribute to your traditional IRA until you were 70 ½, but under the SECURE Act, you can now fund your traditional IRA for as long as you have taxable earned income.

Limitation of "Stretch IRA" Provisions

Under the old rules, beneficiaries were able to stretch taxable RMDs from a retirement account over his or her lifetime. Under the SECURE Act while spouse beneficiaries can still take advantage of this "stretch" distribution, most non-spouse beneficiaries will have to take all the RMDs by the end of the tenth year after the account owner passes away. Consequently, non-spouse beneficiaries who inherit an IRA

or other retirement plan could have tax implications due to the need to take larger distributions in a shorter timeframe.

No Early Withdrawal Penalty for IRAs and 401(k)s When New Child Arrives.

Typically, you must pay a 10% penalty when you withdraw funds from your IRA or 401(k) before you reach 59 ½. But now, with the new rules, you can withdraw up to \$5,000 from your retirement plan without paying the early withdrawal penalty, as long as you take the money within one year of a child being born or an adoption becoming final.

Some provisions of the SECURE Act primarily affect business owners:

Multi-employer Retirement Plans

Unrelated companies can now work together to offer employees a 401(k) plan with less administrative work, lower costs and fewer fiduciary responsibilities than individual employers now encounter when offering their own retirement plans.

Tax Credit for Automatic Enrollment

The new law provides a tax credit of \$500 for some smaller employers who set up automatic enrollment in their retirement plans. Plus, a tax credit for establishing a retirement plan has been increased from \$500 to \$5,000.

Use of Annuities in 401(k) Plans

It will now be easier for employers to consider including annuities as an investment option within 401(k) plans. Previously, many businesses avoided offering annuities in these plans due to liability concerns related to the annuity provider, but the new rules should help reduce these concerns.



Herd Against Hunger

n April 26, Herd Against Hunger 2, which aims to set another world record to benefit the needy in our communities, will take place at Beachwood High School.

In 2018, Lena Leland and Beachwood Schools student activities coordinator Craig Alexander organized Herd Against Hunger to benefit the 21% of people in Northeast Ohio who live in food-insecure households. The goal of the event was to break the world record for longest continuous sandwich chain. Volunteers broke the world record, making 32,300 Sunbutter and jelly sandwiches which, if placed in a single-file line, would have spanned approximately 2.5 miles or 13,300 feet.



Sandwiches were then packaged and delivered to soup kitchens and shelters.

In April, those who participate in Herd Against Hunger 2 will assemble more than 5,000 care packages of food, toiletries, and socks; and distribute them to shelters and food pantries throughout NE Ohio. Drawstring backpack care packages will be filled by volunteers, and then organized on the gym floor to create the world's largest backpack mosaic.





For Beachwood residents, wastewater is transported to the Sewer District via the Heights-Hilltop Interceptor and is treated at the Easterly Wastewater Treatment Plant near the Cleveland and Bratenahl border.

The bills you receive each month help support this and all other clean water investment in the region.

The Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District understands that customers have challenges that can make paying utility bills difficult. The following cost-saving programs benefit eligible customers.

They include the Homestead Program, Summer Sprinkling Program, Wastewater Affordability Program, Crisis Assistance Program, and Plumbing Assistance Program.



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
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
