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Letter from THE EDITOR

As a Neighborhood Outreach Partner of the 42nd Annual Cleveland International Film Festival, I recently attended several CIFF films. The festival showcased 216 feature films, 253 short films, 14 virtual reality films, and 6 interactive media projects – representing 72 countries.

ONE can make a difference, use your creative abilities, recognize the power of unity when working for a common cause, don't judge another's path if you haven't walked their journey, stand up against prejudice, be accepting, and recognize that you are strong enough to overcome adversity.

I especially enjoyed the "shorts," defined by The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences as "an original motion picture that has a running time of 40 minutes or less." Based on the shorts I saw, each film's storyline was thought provoking – some entertaining, some educational, and some inspirational. When filmmakers can elicit an emotional response from their audience – and/or have them still thinking about the movie once they've left the theater – they have done a great job. Listed are some of the short films that I continued to ponder long after the movie ended.

- **The Enlightenment Project** shows how Yvonne Pointer, a grieving mother from Cleveland, and Anthony Tay, an impoverished boy from Ghana, Africa, turned their pain into purpose and their purpose into action by building schools and educating the youth in Africa. The movie clearly sends the message that each of us can make a difference – a message that is currently being spread through Beachwood with "The ONE Campaign," a program that was created by Greg Perry's marketing class at Beachwood High School.
- **Full Circle** is a short film about creating. Its message? We all have creative abilities. Just because someone may have told you at an early age that you couldn't do something or that what you had created was bad, don't let it crush your dreams. Go for it!
- **Grove Hill: A True Story** documents the 50-year history of the Chagrin Falls pumpkin roll. It shares messages of tradition, community identity, and the power of unity for a common cause. This film was especially interesting because of its local flair.
- In **One Man's Perspective**, three individuals have an encounter at a gas station that turns into an uncomfortable conversation, based on a first impression. It shows that assumptions are often false, and that things aren't always what they seem. We shouldn't judge another's path if we haven't walked their journey.
- **The Driver is Red**, set in Argentina in 1960, is a true crime documentary that follows the story of Israeli secret agent Zvi Aharoni as he hunted down one of the highest-ranking Nazi war criminals on the

run. This animated film was created to share the importance of standing up against prejudice and remembering history. And, there is no statute of limitations on evil.

- **Mrs. McCutcheon** is the story of a boy who was born in the wrong body. He chooses to be addressed by the name Mrs. McCutcheon rather than his birth name, Tom. He also prefers to wear a dress, and has trouble finding acceptance from his peers – except for Trevor, who also suffers prejudice due to his Aboriginal heritage. With the school dance only days away, Tom is thrust on a journey of self-discovery and sacrifices to find his own place in the world. The film gives voice to the 14.8 million transgender and gender-diverse children in the world, with the hopes of educating viewers to be more accepting.
- **Zion** is the story of Zion Shaver, a young wrestler who was born without legs and grew up in foster care. It is a heartfelt story about overcoming adversity. In an article published by ESPN, Shaver is quoted as saying, "In wrestling, it's all or nothing. So if I want something, I just have to go for it and give 100 percent effort and hopefully I get it."
- **A Whole World for a Little World** is a story of a woman who shares a great fairy tale with her adorable baby daughter. Its powerful message implies that every day is a gift – Say what you need to say.

The messages conveyed through these CIFF films are important reminders to all of us, and as Beachwood High School graduation approaches, I encourage all seniors to remember them, no matter where their paths may lead. ONE can make a difference, use your creative abilities, recognize the power of unity when working for a common cause, don't judge another's path if you haven't walked their journey, stand up against prejudice, be accepting, and recognize that you are strong enough to overcome adversity.

I wish you all a month full of good health and inner peace – and, CONGRATULATIONS to the class of 2018!

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

Despite some cold and snowy Northeast Ohio February weather, the Alzheimer's Association Cleveland Area Chapter's three volunteer open house events were successful, attracting nearly 70 new potential volunteers.

The Race Sets Out to Advance Breast Cancer Research

Kids continue making the annual Mother's Day event a success

Now in its 15th year, The Race sets out to advance breast cancer research at University Hospitals (UH) Seidman Cancer Center this Mother's Day, May 13, at Legacy Village. Monica Robins, senior health correspondent for Channel 3, is the honorary chair for this event.

The Race is a 5K and 1-mile walk/run that raises awareness and funds for innovative breast cancer research. The Race is organized primarily by high school students, empowering them to enact change as they gain skills in leadership, organization and philanthropy. To date, The Race has raised over \$1,000,000 for breast cancer research in Northeast Ohio. The Race encourages children to make a difference by bringing the community together to raise awareness, provide support and raise funds for breast cancer research. All the money raised benefits UH Seidman Cancer Center.

Brother and sister duo, Josh Berns, 26, and Dani Berns, 24, founded The Race in 2004 and have remained involved in the organization. Younger sister Abby, 15, also participates and is currently part of The Race Teen Leadership Board. The Race Teen Leadership Board, comprised of high school students from several Northeast Ohio schools, have assumed responsibility for the organization and production of the event. The Teen Leadership Board is under the direction of The Effective Leadership Academy (ELA). ELA is

a nonprofit organization committed to building leadership, public speaking and 21st-century skills.

The Race will be honoring Dee Dee Miller this year. Dee Dee was diagnosed with de novo stage IV breast cancer in June 2015. De novo means this was her first diagnosis as opposed to someone who had early stage cancer first, followed by a recurrence. Roughly 8-10 percent of women diagnosed with breast cancer each year start out as de novo stage IV. Since her mother died of breast cancer at 43, she had been undergoing high risk screening and even genetic testing long before her diagnosis. Her cancer is likely a "yet-to-be discovered mutation," according to the geneticist she saw. Despite what appeared to be devastating news, there was much hope. The team at UH Seidman Cancer Center started Dee Dee on a drug just out of clinical trial that not only kept her cancer from spreading, but destroyed the metastasis in her liver, and thus gave Dee Dee a chance at long-term remission. The need to talk with other women with stage IV breast cancer led Dee Dee to join the Cleveland Area Peer 2 Peer Meta-

vivor Support Group, an amazing group of women from Northeast Ohio who share news and provide support for women with stage IV breast cancer. She is so grateful to University Hospitals for their cutting-edge research and clinical trials that have enabled her to reach this point and looks forward to offering support to other "forever fighters". Nearly three years after the diagnosis, Dee Dee is working full time, traveling with her husband of 34 years and enjoying their three adult sons and one daughter-in-law.

The Race will be held at Legacy Village, 25333 Cedar Rd., Lyndhurst, on Sunday, May 13. Tickets for the one-mile run/walk and 5K are \$20 per adult and \$15 per child. Each registrant will receive a t-shirt, enjoy entertainment, refreshments, prizes and children's activities. Day-of registration begins at 7:30 am. The 5K run starts at 8:30 am. The one-mile walk/run begins at 9:30 am.

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BHS GRAD SHOOTS, SCORES WITH ACADEMY AWARD FOR ANIMATED BASKETBALL SHORT FILM

If attending the 2018 ACADEMY AWARDS® ceremony wasn't mind blowing and surreal enough for Dan Goodman, Beachwood High School class of '91, there was the arresting moment of victory. He earned an OSCAR® as an executive producer of the six-minute animated short film, *Dear Basketball*. The short film brings to life a poem that recently-retired LA Lakers legend Kobe Bryant published on the professional athletes' website, ThePlayersTribune.com.

It's an inspiring capture of Kobe's journey as a six-year-old who dreams of one day playing professional basketball, achieves that goal, and ultimately needs to say good-bye to his life-long passion in this "compelling, heartwarming and unusual cycle-of-life story," Dan states.

As Dan describes it, the scene at the awards ceremony played out with insane intensity.

"I'm watching Mark Hamill open the envelope thinking... holy crap... Luke Skywalker is about to announce the winner! And then he makes a joke about LaLa Land and I'm thinking, 'Oh man... just get on with it already!' and

then he says, 'and the OSCAR® goes to...' and it felt like he paused for about a week and all the air left the building. Then all I heard was 'Dea...' and I and our team seated with me went absolutely crazy! Cheering and yelling! It was the most absurd out-of-body experience."

Quite honestly, what Dan also delights in sharing early in a recent telephone interview from his home in New Jersey is his responsibility for co-creating a mural in a hallway near the library in BHS. The work lasted for about 10 years, until renovations eliminated it. He designed the whimsical piece with classmate



Nicole Maloy during the summer after they graduated, and he proudly describes it as a representative mish-mash of extra-curriculars, sports and academics, surrounding a big Bison mascot in the middle.

These two highlights in his life represent something that Dan, 44, fully recognizes about himself – he's a fine blend of right- and left-brain thinking, combining art and commerce in his daily professional life. Drawing on these hard-wired inclinations, he co-founded Believe Entertainment Group (www.BelieveEnt.com) in late 2009. The New York City-based entertainment company produces video content for digital and TV distribution. He runs it with business partner and best friend Bill Masterson.

The national spotlight continues to shine on Dan with his company's inclusion in the 39th Annual Sports Emmy Awards, sponsored by the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences. Winners will be announced at the ceremony on May 8. Believe Entertainment received nominations in the three categories: outstanding music, editing and post production graphics.

Believe Entertainment has numerous credits that involve collaborations with top entertainment talent. One such project draws

on LeBron James for the animated series, *The LeBrons*. It features a distinctly modern-day Fat Albert tone and incorporates the range of characters LeBron created in a series of memorable Nike commercials. The variety and originality of the programming that Believe produces is striking, with content created in partnership with celebrities such as: DJ and producer Tiësto, comedian Jay Mohr, actress and singer Jennifer Lopez, lifestyle stars Ayesha Curry, Sabrina Soto and Nicole Curtis, comedian Chris Parnell, and prior to *Believe*, with actors/comedians Seth MacFarlane and Sacha Baron Cohen.

Dan traces his creative origins back to elementary school where he was heavily influenced by Hosea Johnson, the late art teacher who worked in Beachwood for decades. "I learned so much from him, and he encouraged my artistic ability. What he taught me has stayed with me and built my confidence."

While attending BHS, Dan created political cartoons for the school newspaper, *The Beachcomber*, and played trumpet with the jazz band. "I have lots of good memories from those days."

He was first able to fully merge his artistic and commercial interests while taking classes at Indiana University, where he majored in business and minored in graphic design. He admits, "It was a weird combination. I'd be walking across campus with my giant portfolio bag and winding up in a large statistics class."

He says his education at IU was enhanced by how the school was uniquely positioned at the cutting edge of technology. It was one of the first universities to provide email for students, and the internet was readily accessible in the library during the days of broadband's infancy. He also came to the school with a huge affinity for computers, and he says he was one of very few students who had his own Mac. He recalls

spending lots of time on it and mastering its capabilities. He landed his first job after college at an advertising agency called Lowe & Partners (an Interpublic Group agency) where he worked on the business side, arranging TV spots, print ads, and later, websites, for clients that included Mercedes-Benz and Sprite. But he also had the opportunity to get involved with the creative process, and its magnetic pull was irresistible.

"I'd go into the dub room and become friends with the producers and other creatives, and I learned how to do things like edit ¾-inch tapes," he explains. This led to thoughts about becoming a producer.

His career was evolving essentially at the dawn of the digital age, with websites and new marketing vehicles like mass email emerging. He staked out some of that turf as the chief digital officer for the New York office of the global ad agency, Ogilvy (a WPP agency). "No one else was doing this type of work longer than I, so they couldn't say I was doing it wrong," he notes wryly.

Some clients like IBM were very progressive and forward thinking,

he explains, and they had big budgets, so this afforded him the chance to become more heavily involved with creating videos for digital placement. “The bandwidth caught up to our needs, so we could place videos on websites and in internet-based ads.”

The digital space was a whole new medium, and Dan found it very exciting, especially as one entering it at such an early stage. He describes a real eye-opening moment when he left Ogilvy for LA-based studio Media Rights Capital as president of their digital division in 2007. There, together with Masterson, they created content with Seth MacFarlane that lampooned pop culture (Seth MacFarlane’s *Cavalcade of Cartoon Comedy*) and successfully launched it through YouTube. “That’s when we knew something very big was going on here with digital distribution.”

This breakthrough largely represented the ability to reach fans directly, with no involvement from standard network channels, and that approach has persisted. Today, within this space, he describes his company’s role as serving its talent partners by being both the studio and the network. “We’re sourcing the talent and content, and we also provide the financing, sales and distribution, so we’re working both sides of the equation.”

Cut back to Kobe. How did the whole *Dear Basketball* animation project happen?

Kobe’s agent sent some documents to Believe, proposing the idea that the poem be brought to life, Dan reports. Kobe was also soliciting the participation of Disney animation legend Glen Keane (*The Little Mermaid*, *Beauty and the Beast*, *Aladdin* and *Pocahontas*) and the renowned composer John Williams (*Star Wars* series, *Jaws*, *Close Encounters of the Third Kind*, *Superman*, *E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial*, the *Indiana Jones* series, the first two *Jurassic Park* films, *Schindler’s List*). He succeeded in attracting their involvement.

It was Glen who “made it go,” and that was a two-year-long creative

Q: What advice would you offer students who are plotting their careers and considering some form of digital production work?

A: It’s a funny idea to offer advice on digital production when I got into it not without even knowing it was going to be a “thing”. I started so early in the digital business that it was never a “career path.” But what I’ve come to learn over the course of my experience in this business is that “doing” outweighs everything. This is a medium and an industry of doers. Yes, plot a course for your career. Yes, do the networking, and put in the hours. Learn from others who have done what you want to do. All critical. But also remember that digital content is about having direct access to audiences and being able to engage with them instantly. So, the best advice I can offer is while you plot your course, simultaneously try to bring your ideas to life however you can and don’t wait for anyone to tell you how it’s “supposed” to be done. Everyone, and I mean EVERYONE, is making it up as they go along these days. That’s the incredible opportunity of digital. I used to tell junior associates of mine at the ad agencies I worked for that the only difference between me and them was that I made stuff up with more confidence than they did. My business partner, Bill, will tell you that I’m wrong 99.9% of the time but I say 100% of everything with conviction. So, put your ideas out there, raise money with crowd sourcing, build a sizzle reel, contribute to any video platform you can find that will post your work and just be involved. None of your ideas will do you any good if you’re sitting on your computer in some presentation at home!

process. “Glen and his team hand drew – old school – all images, frame by frame.” Dan also notes that “John Williams interrupted his scoring for the recent *Star Wars* movie to contribute to this project.”

An undertaking like this one had lots of moving parts, with many contributors, and Believe served as “part of the core team running the project.” It spun off additional content, including a 22-minute documentary covering the making of the short film, plus multiple 3-5 minute anecdotal clips.

The short film, available for viewing at go90.com, won a 2018 Annie Award (specific to the animation industry) for Best Animated Short Subject. Also, it premiered at the 2017 Tribeca Film Festival. What the road to the OSCAR® revealed to Dan was the inner workings of the Academy – “it’s quite the machine.”

The experience of attending the event and walking the red carpet was tremendously humbling, he says. “Bizarre” and “wild” are other descriptors. It’s also a bit of a blur, he adds, but he recalls seeing Allison Janney as he walked into the Dolby Theatre, and standing with Jordan Peele at a bar inside during the cocktail reception before the show began.

Dan’s wife Amy watched the ceremony from the hotel and joined him later to attend Elton John’s after party. His sons, Josh, 15, Noah, 13, and Ethan, 10, watched from their home while his parents, former city council member Fred and Janet Goodman, joined them there, along with his in-laws Henry and Sonia Lieberman.

“As soon as the win was announced, my phone and email went bananas. The best part was meeting up with my wife and the whole team after the ceremony ended and getting to relive the moment with them all over again.”

As Dan reflects on his career and all of his experiences associated with it, he says that he definitely takes business seriously, but not himself. And that’s the perfect expression of the balance between his commercial and creative selves.

Gun Safety



Guns are in more than one-third of all U.S. households, so they're a very real danger to children, whether you own one or not. That's why it's important to talk to kids about the potential dangers of guns, and what to do if they find one.

If you do keep a gun in the house, it's vital to keep it out of sight and out of the reach of kids. The gun should be kept locked and unloaded, and the ammunition stored separately.

Guns and Pretend Play

Allowing kids to play with toy guns is a personal decision, as is how to respond to a child's pretense shooting action during the course of play. Remember that even if you don't allow your kids to have a toy gun, their friends may have them. So explain to your kids that real guns – unlike toy guns or those shown on TV, in movies, or in video games – can seriously injure and even kill a person.

Talking to Kids About Gun Safety

Teach kids to follow these rules if they encounter a gun:

- stop what they're doing
- do not touch the gun
- leave the gun area
- tell an adult right away

It's particularly important for kids to leave the area to avoid being harmed by someone who doesn't know not to touch the gun. A child as young as three years old has the finger strength to pull a trigger. It's also important for kids to tell an adult about a gun that has been found.

If You Have a Gun in Your Home

Many kids are raised with guns in the home, particularly if hunting is a part of family recreation. If you keep a gun in the home, it's important to teach your kids to act in a safe and responsible way around it.

To ensure the safest environment for your family:

- Take the ammunition out of the gun.

- Lock the gun and keep it out of reach of kids. Hiding the gun is not enough.
- Lock the ammunition and store it separately from the gun.
- Store the keys for the gun and the ammunition in a different area from where you store household keys. Keep the keys out of reach of children.
- Lock up gun-cleaning supplies, which are often poisonous.
- When handling or cleaning a gun, adults should never leave the gun unattended.

If you own a gun or have found one in your home and want to dispose of it, call your local police station. Do not dial 911 or an emergency line. Laws differ between states, but generally, the firearm will be checked to ensure that it was not part of a criminal investigation and then it will be destroyed.

Community "buy-back" or "amnesty" days are another disposal option. These programs allow people to bring unwanted guns to a designated place where they will be made unusable. To learn if your community hosts such programs, contact your local police department – but don't wait until one becomes available to dispose of an unwanted firearm.

Gun Safety Outside Your Home

Gun safety does not end when your child leaves your home. Kids can still come into contact with a gun at a neighbor's house, when playing with friends, or under other circumstances away from home.

Be sure to talk to your kids about gun safety outside the home. They might even know which friends have guns in the home and where they are stored – ask them.

Also discuss gun safety with the parents of friends if your child spends time in their homes. It

may feel like an awkward conversation, but the person you ask will likely understand that you only have your child's safety in mind. It is OK to speak up and ask!

If there is a gun in the friend's home, you need to decide if it poses a safety risk to your child. If you're uncomfortable having your child play there, consider offering to host at your house instead.

A Word About BB and Non-powder Guns

Non-powder guns, such as ball-bearing (BB) guns, pellet guns, and paintball guns, are not regulated by the government but can cause serious injury and death.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) recommends that kids under age 16 not use high-velocity BB guns or pellet guns, and these guns should only be used under adult supervision. Kids who have a BB gun, or are likely to find one, must know to never point it at anyone, including themselves.

Paintball guns are known to cause traumatic eye injuries, so kids need to wear protective eye gear. Kids should not put caps for toy guns in their pockets because these can ignite by means of friction and cause burns; the loud noises can damage hearing. (Source: www.kidshealth.org)

In April of 1999, two seniors walked into Columbine High School and murdered 12 students and 1 teacher. At that time I had been on our School Board for nine years and I remember how that day forever changed our approach to the concepts of school safety, gun control laws, bullying, and mental health. Almost 20 years later, very little has changed except we have more mass shootings in schools, malls and entertainment venues. From the member of congress to the first grader, no one is immune. The insanity we call gun violence continues. In the past few weeks, we've seen some growth of the movement to address these issues, led by the courageous students of Parkland, Florida. Closer to home, we just witnessed two individuals with guns in a mall where they should never have been.

As Mayor of Beachwood, I have no greater responsibility

than to keep our residents – especially our children – safe from harm. I urge you to read, share and discuss the safety tips in the adjacent article.

To show my support, I have joined the group Mayors Against Illegal Guns, a program sponsored by former Mayor Michael Bloomberg and part of the Everytown for Gun Safety Program. This is not a program that supports the reduction of any constitutional rights, but rather it seeks to use and expand the tools in place to better protect the general public. In the months ahead, I hope to increase my involvement in the organization and draw from the experiences and ideas of the thousands of mayors across the country who are members. My goal is to use every tool available to continuously improve the level of safety in our community.

The HaZamir teens are part of a program that teaches collaboration, team-building and respect across all segments of Judaism, from secular to religious. They meet weekly @Akiva in Beachwood to rehearse challenging pieces of Jewish choral music, both sacred and contemporary, many with Hebrew texts.

// The work of unity is never done. It takes knowledge, engagement with those who are different from you, and fairness in law and opportunity. It takes coming together for good causes. This is one of the things I cherish most about the United States: we are a nation not only of dreamers but also of fixers.”

I was fortunate enough to hear Dan Rather speak about his new book, *What Unites Us*, and was captivated by his thoughtful and measured intelligence, the elegance of his communication, and his strong yet humble and open approach to discussing the topics we find most polarizing today.

How do we create change? By recognizing that we are better than this. We must not be limited by our opinions or by our beliefs. We must never give up on trying to understand or learn from others simply because they do not see things as we do. By reaching out to others,

showing up for others, being interested in the experience of others (those who may not look like, live like, believe as we do) we create opportunities for understanding, for care, for creating a space that just might allow for more civil engagement, solution-focused problem solving, and ultimately (hopefully) respectful understanding and compromise for the greater good. These opportunities become possible when we take the time to recognize commonalities that exist (care for our children, a strong work ethic, the right to be seen and heard, the necessity for

our beliefs to be recognized and considered) notwithstanding our impassioned differences.

Mr. Rather described the current polarization that has taken over our country as a direct result of self-imposed echo chambers in which we only want to speak, learn from, and watch and read news from sources that validate our own beliefs. This approach perpetuates a pervasive and polarizing “us against them mentality” that diminishes our ability to discover, recognize, acknowledge, come together and lead from what unites us.

Even as we stay true and advo-

cate for what is most important to us, we must not give up on trying to seek commonalities, to find what unites us. We must dedicate ourselves to making our country, our communities, our schools a place for everyone to live and work side by side productively and respectfully with curiosity, openness and compassion.

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Beachwood City Schools Receive National Recognition for Music Education Program

Beachwood City Schools has been honored with the "Best Communities for Music Education Award" from The NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education.

"This award reflects an ongoing and vital commitment to Music Education from the entire Beachwood Schools' learning community, which includes parents, administrators, students and staff," said Lisa Goldman, Beachwood City Schools orchestra director. "The award for 'Best Communities for Music Education' recognizes how we use resources that represent the schools and musical offerings throughout Northeast Ohio. On behalf of the music department in the Beachwood Schools, we are all extremely appreciative of the continued daily support music receives in our schools."

To qualify for this award, Beachwood answered detailed questions about funding, graduation requirements, music class participation, instruction time, facilities, support for the music program, and community music-making programs. Responses were verified with school officials and reviewed by The Music Research Institute at the University of Kansas.

This award recognizes that Beachwood Schools is leading the way with learning opportunities as outlined in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). The legislation guides policy implementation in the states and replaces the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) which was often criticized for an overemphasis on testing – while leaving behind subjects such as music. ESSA recommends music and the arts as important elements of a well-rounded educa-

tion for all children.

Research into music education continues to demonstrate educational/cognitive and social skill benefits for children who make music. A series of landmark studies by scientists and researchers at Northwestern University found a link between students in community music programs and life-long academic success, including higher high school graduation rates and college attendance. In another study from the University, it was discovered that the benefits of early exposure to music education improves how the brain processes and assimilates sounds, a trait that lasts well into adulthood.

Beyond the Northwestern research, other studies have indicated that music education lays the foundation for individual excellence in group settings, creative



problem solving and flexibility in work situations, as well as learning how to give and receive constructive criticism to excel.

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Students Venture to Costa Rica for Educational Spring Break Trip

For junior Haley Hersh, a BHS-sponsored educational spring break trip to Costa Rica solidified her interest in pursuing a career in environmental science. The 8-day adventure was led by Lisa Bugenske, A.P. Environmental Science teacher and ecology club advisor, along with Alex Paulchell, who teaches chemistry and an anatomy and physiology class.

Hersh was well suited to become a participant: "I've always had a thing for nature, plus I'd never been out of the country, so I thought the trip would be an incredible experience," she explains. "It absolutely lived up to those expectations," she adds.

Travel itinerary details were handled by Rustic Pathways, a provider of international service, education, and adventure programs for students around the world. The trip featured a science-based curriculum and was one-and-a-half years in the making. It whisked 10 students – nine girls and one boy – to the hot, tropical climate of Costa Rica, ideally suited to study the many different forms of plant and animal life.

One primary focus for scientific study was the exceptionally delicate life cycle and environmental conditions belonging to endangered sea turtles. They are imperiled by human activity, such as riding ATV's on the beach, leaving trash behind,

installing lights or simply being near them. All of these circumstances scare the turtles when they arrive on shore, so they are likely to head back to the Pacific Ocean without laying their eggs.

The fact is, hardly any sea turtles survive because of poachers, predators and man's footprint on their habitat. Paulchell reports that only 1% of all hatchlings will live to adulthood.

Students were able to witness their nesting habits, which involved burying eggs deep in the sand. They even succeeded in rescuing some babies whose first task was to poke their way out of the nest, and some were unable to do that. Next, they had to crawl to the ocean, a distance of 30-50 meters, and some weren't quite healthy or strong enough to make the journey, so students also aided them and saw them swim safely away in the sea.

Bugenske reports that students initially underwent an adjustment period after arriving in Costa Rica, mostly relating to the extreme heat (in the 90s, with a heat index in the 100s), lack of air conditioning and cold drinks and the presence of insects, although none were harmful.

However, they adapted quickly, she says, and her proudest moment was when she observed the students "being incensed by adult activity that was harm-

ful to the turtles." Later in the week, they also painted signs in Spanish instructing visitors not to disturb the turtles and to dispose of garbage. "They came together as a group and had great attitudes."

Paulchell says that as a chaperone, he understood the importance of modeling good behavior for the students, which meant not complaining, even though everyone was hot and tired. "I wanted everyone to appreciate the novel experiences and to push themselves to be strong."

In addition to studying sea turtles, the weeks' worth of outdoor activities included elements that took some students out of their comfort zone, such as snorkeling, hiking, surfing and whitewater rafting in class four rapids. Other science-based experiences involved visiting an estuary with a mangrove forest; and seeing a park with volcanic activity, including fumaroles, heat geysers and sulfur springs. They swam in a lagoon at the bottom of a great waterfall, too.

Bugenske was impressed by how the students overcame their fears and didn't give up when they were challenged.

Cost Rica also provided exposure to alternative energy solutions, with hydroelectric, geothermal and wind farms, all fully functioning. In fact, Hersh says that she learned important lessons about conservation from

this environment.

"Their water supply is very limited, so people take five-minute showers," she noted. "It's important for us to remember to use only what we need, even though we don't have shortages, because people in plenty of other places don't have what we have, and they must conserve as much as possible."

With most students possessing mobile phones that had international travel plans, they were able to stay connected to friends and family at home. Bugenske says that this sometimes required that she remind the students "to be present and in the moment."

That was not very difficult on the evening when they first arrived. Hersh was stunned by what she saw.

"We ran to the beach to watch the setting sun – it was the most beautiful thing I've ever seen. It faded into (the emergence of) the stars and moon."

The trip ended with another dramatic adventure, but one of a more relaxing variety. They all rode on a catamaran-style sailboat along the coast, which offered stunning sights, Paulchell reports.

The trip cost \$3,000 per person, and Bugenske says she is entertaining the possibility of leading another educational adventure over spring break sometime in the future.

Sports Medicine at UH Ahuja Medical Center Helps Keeps Area Athletes of All Levels in the Game

During football season, you'll usually find University Hospitals orthopedic surgeon James E. Voos, MD, standing on the sidelines at a Cleveland Browns game, ready to treat injuries for some of the most elite athletes in the world.

It is this same level of care that's delivered to youth, high school and college athletes, recreational adult athletes and weekend warriors who seek treatment at UH Ahuja Medical Center. In addition to his role as Head Team Physician for the Cleveland Browns, Dr. Voos is also Interim Chairman, Department of Orthopedic Surgery, Division Chief, Sports Medicine and Medical Director, UH Sports Medicine Institute, UH Cleveland Medical Center.

In his role with the Cleveland Browns, he not only attends every game, but also training camp and the NFL Scouting Combine, where he medically evaluates prospective players. He and his team also conduct annual physicals for the entire Browns organization, coaches and staff included.

While it's exciting to have a front row seat at prime-time NFL games, Dr. Voos enjoys watching the "Friday night lights" just as much.

"I bring my son along," he says of the high school football games he attends. "As a sports medicine doctor, you have to be involved in the community. It's a pleasure to see a patient I've treated for an ACL injury, for example, get safely back out on the field."

Protecting Young Athletes

Among Dr. Voos' passions is preventing injuries in young athletes. Working at the community hospital level at UH Ahuja Medical Center provides opportunities for him to engage with area athletes – and their parents – to stress the importance of prevention as well as treatment.

"Doctors and athletic trainers at all levels of sport have placed greater importance in recent years on concussion awareness, prevention and treatment," he notes. According to the Brain Injury Research Institute, about 10 percent of all contact-sport athletes sustain concussions annually.

At the youth level, Dr. Voos encourages coaches to make sure kids use properly fitted equipment to lessen concussion occurrences. When an athlete does suffer a concussion, the University Hospitals Concussion Management Program, an integrated multidisciplinary network of specialists, helps athletes get back in the game safely. "We provide cognitive evaluations to identify kids with concussions sooner and find the right treatment path," Dr. Voos says.

UH Ahuja Medical Center is one of more than a dozen UH locations where the Concussion Management Program is available. In addition to post-concussion evaluation, the comprehensive program also includes baseline testing administration, concussion management and rehabilitation services

At the youth level, Dr. Voos encourages coaches to make sure kids use properly fitted equipment to lessen concussion occurrences. When an athlete does suffer a concussion, the University Hospitals Concussion Management Program, an integrated multidisciplinary network of specialists, helps athletes get back in the game safely.

Individualized Programs for Safety and Success

Dr. Voos stresses that the Department of Orthopedics at UH Ahuja Medical Center is integrated with the Department of Orthopedics at UH Cleveland Medical Center. "This means we have a wide range of pediatric and adult specialists available," he says, "which allows us to personalize a program to meet each athlete's individual needs."

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CAPTAIN MICHAEL PALUMBO MEMORIAL HIGHWAY

In April, Senator Kenny Yuko, Mayor Martin Horwitz and Bill Mastroianni (from the Ohio Association of Professional Fire Fighters), along with the late Fire Captain Mike Palumbo's family and friends, gathered inside Beachwood Fire Station #1 to pay honor to the late Captain.

Palumbo served the Beachwood Fire Department since 1992 as a fireman, paramedic, SWAT medic and part of the hazmat team. In January of last year, Governor Kasich, in the presence of Captain Palumbo and his family, signed Senate Bill 27, the Michael Louis Palumbo Jr. Act, into law.


Palumbo became the spokesperson for this bill. He battled glioblastoma multiforme (GBM), a very aggressive form of brain cancer. He was diagnosed in September 2015 and lost his battle in May 2017.

After his diagnosis, Palumbo went on to fight for workers' compensation benefits for firefighters and their families after an occupational cancer diagnoses. The bill allows firefighters who are diagnosed with cancer and who meet the set qualifications to now file a claim with the Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation.

In Palumbo's honor, a section of I-271 that runs through Beachwood between mile markers 28 and 32 has been designated as the Captain Michael Palumbo Memorial Highway.

Mayor Horwitz remarked, "It is an honor to host the section of freeway dedicated to Captain Michael Palumbo, a man we recognize today for his 25 years of service to our City and his lifelong dedication to the firefighting profession."

Captain Palumbo left behind his wife of 23 years and five children.



Girls Track State Champs Celebrated at State House




Pickleball Now Available at Beachwood Tennis Courts

When a new trend hits the block, Beachwood is a trendsetter – and pickleball is the hot game in town. Pickleball, an alternative to tennis, is trending nationwide. Invented in the 1960s, pickleball is a paddle sport that combines elements of badminton, tennis and table tennis. Two or four players use solid paddles made of composite aerospace materials, which are exceptionally strong and light, to hit a perforated polymer ball, similar to a whiffle ball, over a net. This is a great sport for all ages and skill levels.

The game has been in CLE for almost seven years. The rules are simple and the game is easy for beginners to learn, but it can develop into a quick, fast-paced, competitive game for experienced players.

This spring, Rick Dula of Northcoast Pickleball, LLC, offers beginning pickleball group lessons and private lessons. He has been running pickleball programs in neighboring communities and looks forward to working in Beachwood.

Plus, the Beachwood Historical Society will host a pickleball doubles tournament on Saturday, July 14. Registered players will receive a t-shirt and enjoy prizes, fun and more.

When talking with Dula about the program, he said, "I'm glad to have an opportunity to expose Beachwood to the latest and greatest."

Dula started playing pickleball about six years ago and got hooked. He started pickleball programs in Solon and Mayfield, and continues to introduce the game to new communities. "We came up with a program in Beachwood with a fair, reasonable price," Dula said. "By the time the first program is over, you'll either love it or just like it."

Dula said it's the most social sport you'll ever play. "If you like

to compete, exercise and socialize – any or all – you'll love pickleball."

Dula is Cuyahoga County East ambassador for the USAPA, where his volunteer job is to help promote pickleball and get it off the ground. The nice thing about playing pickleball is that it can be a family game – even intergenerational. "If you have at least average hand-eye coordination or if you have any previous paddle/racquet sport experience, you can catch on quicker than most people."

Tennis is also hot this spring, with Kevin Vaughn as the city's new tennis pro. "Kevin is a great, dynamic pro, who is also a coach for Beachwood High School," Pete Conces, Beachwood recreation supervisor, told us. "His company, Cleveland Tennis Academy, is the official provider for all our city's tennis programs this spring and summer."

Vaughn provides individualized coaching to clients of all ages and skill levels by teaching modern techniques of tennis fundamentals. He has pioneered tennis programs in Northeast Ohio as a tennis ambassador to the United States Tennis Association and tennis director of private clubs throughout Northeast Ohio.







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Don't Be a Litter Butt!

Why is Litter a Problem?

When trash (plastic bags, bottles, cigarette butts, plastic cigar tips, etc.) is discarded onto the ground, it washes, untreated, into storm drains and directly into our waterways. Trash negatively impacts wildlife and migratory birds, poses hazards for fisherman and boaters, and is an eyesore along streets, parks, and waterways in our community.

Litter Facts. Did You Know?

- Plastic pieces, cigar tips and cigarette filters are continually at the top of the list of trash found at beach cleanups locally and worldwide (Ocean Conservancy).
- More plastic cigar tips are found on Cleveland beaches than in any of the other Great Lakes beach cleanups (Alliance for the Great Lakes).
- Cigarette filters/butts are NOT biodegradable. The acetate filters take years to decompose, and the toxic chemicals trapped in the filters can leak into aquatic ecosystems, threatening our water resources.
- Plastics break down into tiny pieces called microplastics in water, then release toxic chemicals swallowed by fish, birds, snakes, and other wildlife.

What You Can Do:

- **Do Not Litter!** Lake Erie is our source of drinking water, so we need to do our part to clean up pollution and to educate others not to litter.
- **Follow the 3R's** – Reduce, Reuse and Recycle wherever possible.
- **Use reusable shopping bags** instead of single-use plastic bags at the store and recycle bags if the service is available at your grocery store.
- **Don't overfill trash cans** as litter can blow into the street on windy days.
- **If you see illegal dumping**, alert the City's Service or Police Department.
- **Organize a storm drain stenciling activity** in your neighborhood to educate people that only rain goes down the storm drain.
- **Volunteer** at a local stream, beach or park cleanup event.

frequently used items in the kitchen to lower shelves, and rearranging closets to make clothing more accessible. There are ways to clean up a spill that don’t require kneeling on the floor and there are ways to reach objects without climbing on a ladder.

Work and leisure activities: Many people may return to work and hobbies following an illness or surgery with assistance. An occupational therapist can break down an activity into separate parts like standing, stooping, reaching, lifting and sorting, and analyze each part for modifications so the activity becomes possible again.

Personal safety: When normal mobility is altered, regular daily activities may become hazardous. Something as simple as

the throw rug at the front door can result in a fall and serious injury. An occupational therapist can identify potential hazards before accidents happen and provide ways to avoid injury.

Patriotic Baby Cap Pattern (You can use your own pattern, too)

- Dimensions: approximately 4 inches by 10-12 inches. You may knit or crochet.
- Remember, babies heads are all different sizes, but suggested cap size should fit on a grapefruit. Please use baby-soft yarn, 2- or 4-ply acrylic yarn – red, white, and/or blue, or a combination of these colors.
- Needle sizes: 7 or 10 1/2
- Cast on 48 stitches on size 7 needles or 40 stitches on size 10 1/2 needles
- Work in knit 1, purl 1 ribbing for one inch

- Knit in stockinette stitch (knit 1 row, purl 1 row) for 3 inches, ending with purl row. Piece now measures 4 inches from the beginning

Begin Decreasing

- Next row: knit 2 together across the row
- Next row: purl across the row
- Next row: knit 2 together across the row
- Next row: purl across the row
- Next row: knit 2 together across the row

- Cut yarn, leaving a long tail for sewing up the seam. Thread the tail of yarn through a large eye needle and pull through the remaining stitches to remove them from the needle. Pull stitches tight to gather. Sew seam down side of hat, weaving from side to side. Cut yarn and weave in ends. No pompoms or other loose trim.

highest scores on three rigorous exams and flew to Brooklyn to participate in the final tournament. Mendel is the son of Rabbi Moshe and Mrs. Rivky Gancz of Beachwood, who direct Fromovitz Chabad Center in Beachwood.

The Lubavitcher Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem M. Schneerson OBM, encouraged children to thoroughly study all of the Torah's 613 commandments as enumerated and elucidated by Maimonides in his Sefer HaMitzvos. His followers have taken to his words, hosting an annual Chidon (contest) that challenges children to study large

volumes of detailed tests, delve into the intricacies of each mitzva and compete for trophies.

As one of the finalists in his group, Mendel flew into New York, where he enjoyed four days of exciting trips, competitive games that tested his knowledge, and the final test, where he earned a plaque and a medal.

Organized by Merkos L'Inyonei Chinuch, the educational arm of the Chabad-Lubavitch movement,

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
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Tikkun Leil Shavuot – All Night Study Event
