# Specialized spine care: Providing relief when you need it.

For some people, it becomes impossible to think of anything else but the pain.

## Common areas of pain that stem from the spine include:

- Lower back

The Specialized Spine Clinic (SSC) at Cleveland Clinic Hillcrest Hospital addresses new spine pain that has been present for less than six months.

In one appointment, patients see a specially trained medical spine practitioner and a

physical therapist, who together develop a care plan tailored to the patient's specific needs. The first physical therapy treatment usually occurs during the initial visit.



"This care model helps ensure that the right patient gets the right care at the right time," says Marzena Buzanowska, MD, a physical medicine and rehabilitation specialist at Hillcrest Hospital.

"The team-based approach decreases unnecessary medical visits, facilitates patient education and accelerates access to the right treatment."

Physical therapy is the primary mode of treatment for spine issues. In some cases, patients may be referred for additional medical or surgical intervention.

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

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
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

# NOISE NORTHEAST OHIO INNOVATIVE STEM EXPO

## Featuring Nick Uhas of America's Got Talent

On Saturday, April 13, from 11 am to 4 pm, the Beachwood High School Junior Achievement Program will present NOISE (Northeast Ohio Innovative STEM Expo), a one-day expo showcasing Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics principles. NOISE will be held at Beachwood High School. Hands-on activities will be displayed, as well as a STEM Marketplace that will highlight student entrepreneurship emerging from STEM. NOISE is a family-friendly event that is free and open to the community.

STEM is a concept based on the idea of educating students in science, technology, engineering and mathematics in an interdisciplinary and applied approach. Beachwood High School marketing teacher Greg Perry told us that the marketing students wanted to produce another exciting NOISE event based on the successful 2017 program. They've worked throughout the school year to identify companies and organizations that will join the

2019 event. Promoting, selling, and producing NOISE is the best form of project-based learning for these aspiring business professionals.

The NOISE Expo will be inspirational to kids and adults alike. With more than 120 exhibitors and thousands of attendees expected, interactive activities are sure to attract interest. In addition, the attendees will receive their own STEM tote bags, and the first 1,000 students will also be given a

free NOISE lab coat and goggles. Parking will be available at Beachwood High School, the Beachwood Municipal Complex and Beachwood Family Aquatic Center, with free shuttle service to and from the high school from off-site locations.

Nick Uhas, from the 12th season of America's Got Talent, will perform free shows at 12 and 2 pm. Nick, the star of "Nickipedia" on YouTube, will explore scientific concepts and chemical reactions in ways that are approachable, fun, and engaging. His focus is on making science active and demonstrable. Nick also appeared on The Today Show. Tickets are free, but must be reserved. Visit [www.beachwoodschoools.org](http://www.beachwoodschoools.org) or [www.noiseexpo.com](http://www.noiseexpo.com) for details. Attendees must be in Beachwood High School at least 30 minutes before the reserved show's start time.

NOISE offers something for everyone – demonstrations, the ASM Mini-Materials Camp, food trucks, shopping, The Young Entrepreneur Market, and STEM toy shop. Attendees may participate in hands-on demonstrations from Great Lakes Science Center, ASM International, the Nature Center at Shaker Lakes, and Smuckers, to name a few.

The Young Entrepreneur Market will feature 50 Northeast Ohio middle school, high school and college entrepreneurs from area schools, along with their products and businesses. It is a partnership with University School's Young Entrepreneur Institute and sponsored by the Burton D. Morgan Foundation. After stealing the show at NOISE in 2017, young entrepreneurs will once again showcase their wares and services, from lawn care to clothing, and makeup to hair styling.

NOISE was developed by 39 senior students who participated in the Marketing/Junior Achievement Program at Beachwood High School under the direction of teacher Greg Perry.

The class works as a company with an organizational structure and management positions.

## BHS Grad Returns as Gold Sponsor

Daniel Anstandig, a former student at BHS (class of 2001) who built a career with the principles of STEM, supports NOISE as a gold sponsor.

Daniel hosted his own radio show on WELW-AM in Willoughby at age 9. At age 14, he started DAER Media, and sold ad time for radio stations across the country. Just before Daniel graduated from BHS, he sold his company to Microsoft. He continued his education at John Carrol University, but soon left to focus on international


consulting work with broadcasters and traditional media companies on digital audience and revenue strategies.

Daniel has been recognized by *Billboard Magazine* as one of the top five innovators in media. In 2012, he created TopicPulse, which provides news rooms and content producers with real-time data about what their audiences are talking about on social media.

ASM consultant Tom Dudley explains to (from left:) Noah Shore, Madison McShepard and Ryan Muencz how tennis ball models have significant relevance to NOISE and science. A ball at each corner of a cube with a ball in the center of a cube represents one of the crystal structures of iron and is called a body centered cubic (BCC). Tom was holding the face centered cubic crystal structure, which has an iron atom at each corner of the cube and one in the center of each face (FCC-like the number 5 in a pair of dice). This is the form iron takes when it has over 8% nickel in it and is known as stainless steel. The change in the phase of iron from FCC to BCC will be demonstrated at NOISE.

## ASM Mini-Materials Camp Returns to NOISE

The ASM Mini-Materials Camp, a real hit at NOISE 2017, returns to this year's expo. ASM International, a gold-level sponsor, will man demonstration tables that provide hands-on opportunities for students to learn about metals and expand their interest in science and engineering with its education foundation, staff and volunteers. Demonstration topics include: Keeping Astronauts Cool, Can Steel Take the Heat?, Melting Metal with Microwaves, Super Absorbent Polymers, and Nitinol – A Shape-Memory Alloy.

"The U.S. and other developed countries are challenged with increasing the pipeline of new engineers," said Carrie Wilson, executive director of the ASM Materials Education Foundation. "Many young people are not studying science and engineering, mostly due to lack of exposure to the exciting careers available in these fields.

"There is a critical need to provide employers with qualified applicants for the growing number

of highly-skilled jobs in the fields of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM)," Carrie added. "Our Mini-Materials Camp provides opportunities for students to expand their knowledge in these areas."

ASM International, formerly the American Society for Metals, is located on a 45-acre campus in Russell Township. It features a state-of-the-art materials laboratory and classroom facility where professionals can develop and strengthen their knowledge of materials science, metallurgy, failure analysis, heat treating, surface engineering, metallography, and other topics.

ASM International, located at 9639 Kinsman Road in Novelty, is known for its geodesic dome, the largest open-work geodesic dome in the world. The dome's purpose is aesthetic and symbolic. Although the facility is closed to the public, its gardens and grounds are open during the normal work week, Monday through Friday, 7 am to 6 pm.

# The Power of Affirmations

**T**o be human is to be flawed. We are imperfect beings. Perfection does not exist. We create images of what we believe our lives should look like and then construct narratives of not being enough when our reality does not reflect our fantasy. This is self-sabotage. When practiced over time, self-criticism, self-defeating thoughts or feelings of not being enough become our automatic response and our default to vulnerability is triggered.

Comparison is often the root cause of insecurities. People see in others what they wish they experienced in themselves. Focusing on your perceived flaws while filtering only the strengths of others creates a reality imbalance allowing space for the distorted belief that you are not enough to become your default, your automatic response, your truth. Not thin enough, strong enough, wealthy enough, smart enough, happy enough, liked enough...

Our brains are powerful. We can turn any thought into truth, any belief into our reality. When you feel triggered, practice replacing your automatic (default) response of self-defeating, self-critical narratives with an affirmation response. The goal is for your self-talk to become connected to your strengths, not your insecurities. What you give power to is what grows. If you give power to insecurities rather than

strengths, your insecurities becomes the lense through which you see yourself and your world. You, and only you, have the ability to empower yourself to live your life forward in strength.

Replace intrusive thoughts that sabotage confidence with affirmations:

#### **I am ...**

- Capable of growth
- Resilient
- Strong
- Willing to try
- Able to adapt to change
- Able to ask for help
- Human
- Enough

#### **I try ...**

- To be responsible
- To be kind
- To be helpful
- To live healthy
- To show up
- To treat myself and others with respect
- To treat myself and others with compassion
- To learn from my mistakes

#### **I am learning ...**

- To focus on and grow my strengths
- To trust my instincts
- To approach life one day at a time
- To practice self-care
- To let go of what keeps me stuck (perfectionism, guilt, shame, regret, judgement of self and others, comparison)

While this exercise may remind you of the SNL character Stuart Smalley and his daily affirmation skit, "I'm good enough, I'm smart enough and, doggone it, people like me," science proves that self-affirmation works.

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You, and only you, have the ability to empower yourself to live your life forward in strength.

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Our thoughts impact our mood, our choices, how we see ourselves and, ultimately, our ability to live our lives authentically and with strength. There is endless research and countless books on the power of positive thinking. There is no inherent risk or downside to practicing an affirmation response in place of a critical, self-defeatist one. It is a tool accessible to all. Affirmations increase positive self-awareness, self-acceptance, and self-confidence, and they foster a growth mindset. It takes the same amount of time to think a negative thought as a positive one, but the impact is drastically different.

## Beachwood Writer/Director Debuts Short Film at CIFF

Beachwood resident Jeremy Borison has a passion for film. He graduated from Fuchs Mizrahi in 2010, earned his bachelor's degree in film at University of Michigan, and is now pursuing his passion in Los Angeles as an independent filmmaker. Jeremy is back in town for the premiere screenings of *Boxes*, his 13-minute short film, which will screen April 2-5 at Tower City, in the Cleveland International Film Festival.

*Boxes* follows two characters – a grandmother, Oma, and her granddaughter, Jessica – while they spend the afternoon packing up Jessica's recently-deceased grandfather's belongings. As they reminisce, hidden truths about their lives come to light. Oma tries her best to hide a secret life she lived before the Holocaust, while Jessica tries her hardest to come out about her sexuality.

"As creators of the project, this film is very dear to us. It is a passion project that stems from true stories in our own lives, about the intersectionality of identities, the clash between religion and sexuality, and the hidden nature of family secrets," Jeremy told us, referring to his own life story and that of executive producer Shira Steiner. "We are excited to bring this story to life and create something meaningful to share with others on screen."

Jeremy also said that he is proud to be screening *Boxes* in Cleveland, so as to provide an opportunity for those who contributed to his GoFundMe initiative to bring his project to the big screen.

The movie's storyline came about after one of Jeremy's friends lived a similar story – a secret that was never disclosed. "We began to have a dialogue of how this may have played out had my friend and her grandmother known and communicated their secrets with each other," Jeremy told us.

Religion and LGBT rights are very personal to Jeremy since he comes from a religious background and is gay, and this movie touches on both.

"It's still very hard for LGBTQ people to come out in religious and observant communities, especially within families of Holocaust survivors. The pressure of everything a grandparent has suffered as an excuse for not coming out is very real," he said. "We have an important message to share and we're proud to have a platform on which to do so."

*Boxes* recently had its first private screening in Los Angeles, which was followed by a Q&A with three LGBTQ grandchildren of Holocaust survivors, and a discussion about the pressure of those often-conflicting identities.

"The Q&A started a dialogue, which is our goal," Jeremy said. "The trauma of the Holocaust still affects family members of survivors. We were able to highlight the direct conflict this creates with LGBTQ relatives concerning their need to share their secrets and their grandparents' needs to hide theirs."

*Boxes* will be making its festival premiere at CIFF and, thus far, has been accepted into three other festivals – the New Jersey Film Festival, Detroit Jewish Film Festival, and Poland LGBT Festival, where it will tour around the entire country.

What's next for Jeremy? A similar script that will be made into a full-length feature film. If you wish to become involved later this year through his kickstarter fundraising efforts, contact Jeremy



## Luke, a Golden Therapy Dog

**L**uke Ellis doesn't have a master's degree in social work, but he can soothe people in distress, help children and adults heal from trauma, and even offer a strong shoulder to lean on.

In fact, all that Luke needs is a dog biscuit and a scratch behind his ears to know he is well loved and has done his job well.

Luke, a handsome, 6-year-old golden retriever, is the constant companion of Tunbridge Road resident Debbie Ellis. "I've had dogs all my life, but there's never been one like Luke," Debbie says. "By the time he was 18 months old, I knew he was special."

Debbie is not Luke's only fan; he is the dog magnet for many kids in her neighborhood. "Children ring my doorbell and ask if Luke can come play outside or at their homes," she says. "He goes sledding with the kids, attends their soccer games, and is invited over for neighborhood movie nights."

Debbie says she and her late husband, Larry, got Luke from a breeder in Wellington, Ohio. "Luke walked over to us and snuggled on our laps," Debbie says, "and we immediately knew he was The One."

Sadly, Larry died one year after Luke became part of the family. "Luke was a great comfort to Larry when he was ill," says Debbie. "I realized he would make a great therapy dog. He intuitively sensed when someone was not feeling well and made an emotional connection. His heart is as big as he is."

When Debbie enrolled Luke in dog-therapy class, Luke was a natural and passed all his tests on the first try.

During his training, Luke was taught to pay no attention to other dogs or to items left on the floor, to be able to deal with close and unexpected encounters, and to stay calm around noisy hospital equipment, like walkers, crutches, wheelchairs and beeping machines. He was also trained to obey commands of sit, down, and stay, which enabled him to sit patiently for up to an hour while strangers petted or hugged him.

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
Luke is part of the Pet's Pal program at Rainbow Babies & Children's Hospital, and he visits Menorah Park residents and Hillcrest Hospital patients. He also provides solace for overworked and stressed nurses in hospitals, and students on college campuses during finals.

Additionally, Luke is part of "Tail Waggin' Tutors," a read-aloud program at local schools and libraries. "Struggling readers are not intimidated or self-conscious when they read aloud to dogs, and with Luke's presence, students relax enough to improve their reading skills," says Debbie.

Luke, the stellar therapy dog, may not be a Jedi Knight like Luke Skywalker, but his deeds of kindness are out of this world.

pARTners Project Studio, a safe, engaging space focused on the creative process, and ABILITY, proudly announces their IDEAS Exhibition, which will take place at the Beachwood Library, April 7 – 27 during library hours, with a meet-the-artists reception on Sunday, April 7, from 2 to 4 pm.

Art from pARTners Project Studio members Blaise E. (Beachwood), David R., and Julia L. will be on exhibit and for sale. When we asked them about the importance of art in their lives, both Blaise and David said that art makes them feel comfortable and proud. Julia said, “Art makes me feel better when the world starts to make me feel numb. Without it I would be living in a numb world with nothing to make me feel whole. It allows me to be myself.”

pARTners Project Studio welcomes adult artists of all abilities, and is a safe space for budding artists to build skills.

Project manager and founder Amy Bennett, MFA, explained how this program differs from an art class. “Members work in their media of choice and feel as though ‘they are boss over their own art here,’ as stated by a former member,” she said.

“When artists apply, they must have a portfolio and talk about their goals,” Amy added. “The program is for artists who want to advance their skills above the hobby level. Once they are accepted, we facilitate a program to help them create and sell their art, and to learn skills to become a professional artist.”

Amy told us that in addition to honing their art skills, members learn conversation skills, responsibility, and how to give and receive feedback – life skills that build confidence both in and out of the studio.

“In the world of people with disabilities, the average person is

reluctant to say anything critical because he or she feels it may add to their stress,” Amy said. “Here, guest artists who do a demonstration or give instruction ask for and provide feedback, which helps them become more confident, empathetic people.”

The upcoming IDEAS show provides a space for artists to sell their work, and artists receive 70% of the sale price of work that sells.

“Legitimizing our members’ passion with studio space and an avenue for sales is fulfilling,” Amy said. “Our vision is to have this sort of protocol for studios open throughout the country. Everyone deserves a fair shake.”

Former sales have taken place in pop-up shops at the Beachland Ballroom and Euclid Art Walk. “It’s a turning point for artists when they sell their artwork,” Amy told us. “Once you sell that first piece, the loop closes. Artists see that other people like their work, which builds their confidence and motivates them to create more.”

Once the top designs are selected, artists will be commissioned to paint them on 55-gallon rain barrels that, when completed, will be exhibited in the Beachwood Community Center.

Commissioned artists will be paid \$100. Barrels will be auctioned via a silent auction, with the proceeds to benefit the Friends of Euclid Creek Conservation Fund. Prizes will be awarded to the top-three designs in the categories of professional artist, amateur, and child artist as determined by a jury of local artists and arts professionals.

**S**troke is probably one of the scariest medical events that most people can even imagine. Chances are you know of someone who had a stroke and experiences some lasting disability as a result.

The realities about stroke are somewhat grim. Stroke is the fifth leading cause of death in the United States and is the number one cause of disability among adults.

Stroke can happen to anyone at any time, sometimes without warning, which is one of the reasons people find it so scary. Fortunately, there are two things you can do to help prevent disability from stroke, according to Heather Dickinson, RN, the stroke program coordinator at University Hospitals Ahuja Medical Center.

“First, everyone should be as familiar with the symptoms of stroke – a brain attack – as they are with heart attack symptoms,” she says. “Secondly, it’s important to understand your risk factors and manage them to reduce your risk for stroke.”

According to the National Institutes for Health, the top five stroke symptoms to remember are:

- Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm, or leg, especially on one side of the body
- Sudden confusion, or trouble talking or understanding speech or the written word
- Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness or loss of balance or coordination
- Sudden severe headache with no known cause

Sudden nausea or vomiting not caused by a virus and fainting or seizures without some other cause also can be symptoms of stroke.

Dickinson emphasizes that the outcome of a stroke is related to how quickly the individual receives treatment. “A stroke is a medical emergency that requires immediate attention as soon as the first symptoms appear,” she says. “If you or someone you are with experiences any of these symptoms, call 911 immediately.”

### Life-Saving Treatment

A stroke occurs when the flow of blood to a part of the brain is cut off. This can be due to a blood clot (ischemic stroke) or a burst blood vessel bleeding into the brain (hemorrhagic stroke).

The clot-busting drug tPA was developed about 20 years ago, the first effective treatment for stroke. But tPA still is effective only if given within the first three to six hours following the onset of symptoms. Beyond that, treatment options have been few.

Today, with improvements in clot removal technology and advanced brain imaging, when a patient with an acute ischemic stroke gets to an emergency room within 24 hours of experiencing symptoms, they still have a good chance for a complete recovery when their MRI shows brain tissue is still salvageable. Throughout the

UH health system, including UH Ahuja, the stroke team evaluates these patients to determine who is eligible for this procedure in the cath lab, where an interventional vascular specialist opens the blocked artery to remove the clot.

UH adopted this revolutionary new treatment – called mechanical thrombectomy – as the result of the DAWN study that showed its effectiveness. UH was a major participant in this study.

### Stroke Prevention 101

Although the incidence of heart and vascular disease and metabolic disorders increases with age, “stroke isn’t an inevitable consequence of aging,” Dickinson notes. “It’s important for individuals of any age, including seniors, to manager their risk factors to reduce their chance of having a stroke.”

That includes the usual healthy lifestyle guidelines. Getting regular exercise, smoking cessation, eating a healthy diet, minimizing stress and getting plenty of sleep are as important for stroke prevention as they are for heart attack prevention.

“For senior citizens, studies show that following these guidelines reduces their stroke risk to about the same as for younger people,” Dickinson adds.



# The Rockin' Wish of Maureen Chase: To Meet or Talk to Tommy Shaw

If the strength of the human spirit could take physical form, it would mirror the smile, eyes, heart and soul of Maureen Chase. Her friends call her Reenie. She's a warm, funny and beautiful 60-year-old woman who lives at Menorah Park. She has hopes and dreams like anyone else, but realizes they may never come true.

Reenie survived a very serious stroke six years ago, and has since been diagnosed with terminal cancer. No one knows what the future holds, but she is determined to remain positive.

On this cold and snowy afternoon, Reenie is in her room, surrounded by cute stuffed animals, mostly pigs and piglets. She had a large collection when she owned her own home, before the stroke. After the stroke, for four months, Reenie was "out of it." When she became more cognizant, nearly everything, including her independence, was gone.

From her wheelchair, Reenie talks about before and after in terms of her life pre-and post-stroke. And now, she adds terminal cancer to the mix. She sighs, and recalls going to concerts. Her favorite band is Styx, and Tommy Shaw is her very favorite member of the band. "I got to see him in real life long ago," she said, "And I dream of meeting him again."

Reenie laughed as she recalled meeting Aerosmith's Steven Tyler, only to tell him she wasn't going to his concert because she had tickets to Bob Seger's show instead. "It was a lifetime ago, when thoughts of being in a wheelchair; or without the use of my arm, leg, or facial muscles; or living anywhere but in my own home, never occurred to me."

The stroke came like a thief in the night. Reenie was at her cousin's house, fell asleep, and was awakened a few hours later by the sound of her cousin calling her name. That's when she realized she was totally

debilitated. "I couldn't walk, talk, or move my arms," she recalled. "I knew something was wrong, but I couldn't say anything. The words wouldn't come."

Reenie was placed in rehab at a local hospital. There for several months, and still unable to talk, she felt helpless. Then, one day, a friend who had been coming to see her regularly was there and her words came. She said, "Why don't you leave and come back another time."

---

To fill her days, Reenie watches her favorite shows on TV and looks forward to therapy, art, and baking sessions. She reflects on her life and told us that although she has one lifelong friend who she talks to, she misses her other friendships and says that it would be nice to hear from more people.

---

Although she could say some words, Reenie struggled to regain her speech. Today, she is able to communicate beautifully and poignantly about her journey – a rough one, but one she accepts. "It is what it is," she concludes. "I tell myself that I'm fantastic and I'm a survivor; the sun comes up and goes down. It is what it is."

That being said, Reenie doesn't believe in helplessly waiting for

her life to fade. "Just survive," she says. "And bake – I love to bake and bake!"

She moves her 'good hand' to simulate cracking eggs, and mentions that she is part of the baking club, which will meet later that day.

Several times a month, Reenie engages in programs and activities that are good for her mind, body, and spirit. She finds comfort and a creative outlet in art therapy, relaxation in massages, and spiritual wellness in Reiki.

"I don't know what it is about Reiki, but I laugh so hard!" she said, and the laughter is a reprieve.

To fill her days, Reenie watches her favorite shows on TV and looks forward to therapy, art, and baking sessions. She reflects on her life and told us that although she has one lifelong friend who she talks to, she misses her other friendships and says that it would be nice to hear from more people.

How does she deal with the inevitable? With hope, like a true survivor.

"I know that my mom and dad are guardian angels who are watching over me," she said.

"I keep the faith and hold what's dear to me in my heart."

Reenie's positive attitude emits a ray of light to all who meet her. She closes her eyes and remembers playing albums on her record player. She remembers parts of the career she left behind. She remembers using her right hand. She sees growth from her circumstances. She speaks up, and seizes the moments to let her voice be heard.

Sometimes, being a survivor, in the truest sense of the word, means knowing that you have your inner strength and spirit, along with hope that miracles still can happen. It's a portrait of strength on a canvas that is being created by Reenie's strong desire to live her life to the fullest, here and now, regardless of what the future may bring.

## I'm So sad... Now What?

Grief is a common thread among humans, and it is even more common for seniors to struggle with grief. Sadly, in society at large, death and the afterlife are subjects that often remain undiscussed, which keeps us unprepared.

Furthermore, as we age, short-term memory may be lost, and dementia may cause us to relive our past losses. Likewise, losing a spouse of many decades can be devastating. Regretfully, parents may sometimes outlive their children, and such losses are indescribable.

What are some of the best ways to deal with grief?

- Getting an understanding of human transience and eternity early on can be very helpful.
- Turn to traditions to reap benefits of ancient customs.
- Visit the graves of loved ones to imbue us with a sense of our own mortality and immortality.
- Choose burial plots with a spouse early on.
- Rededicate our lives to the values and memory of a loved one to re-energize us, while allowing us to grieve.

- Discuss one's pain with a professional, religious leader or grief counselor.

We must never run from our loss, but rather allow ourselves to express our grief in healthy ways. Most important, if one is experiencing clinical depression, always consult our doctor.

Understand that grieving is a process. Different people need to grieve in different ways, and for different lengths of time.

Ultimately, only the grieving parties will be able to help themselves by slowly readjusting their lives, when they are ready. Unacknowledged grief remains painfully bottled up inside. This concealed agony weakens an individual over time in various ways. By opening up to the right people, the internal agony may slowly be released, thus allowing This allows for a more therapeutic resolution to one's anguish.

# Hop to It, Get Outside!



The City of Beachwood and Cuyahoga Soil & Water Conservation District recommend the following:

- Test your soil. If results indicate the need, amend it. Organic products are best.
- Tolerate some weeds in your garden, they are not the enemy. Plant biodiversity in your lawn provides food for pollinators and beneficial soil organisms. If you must remove weeds, try these non-synthetic chemical approaches:
  - Apply corn gluten meal to prevent annual weed seeds from germinating.
  - Spot treat existing weeds with an organic weed control product that contains molasses or liquid iron.
- Hand-pull weeds. Purchase a tool to help, like a Speedy Weedy, or encourage your children to pull!

### Did you know?

- Don't leave fertilizer pellets and grass clippings on your driveway and hard surfaces. They wash into streams and rivers, blocking water flow and adding unwanted nutrients. Aim your mower so grass clippings stay on the lawn, where nutrients are needed.



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# 5 Ways for Businesses and Employees to Protect their Data this Year

In today's modern workplace, embracing and implementing technology is necessary to promote innovation and efficiency. Without proper IT practices, technology can become the number one threat to business security. A lack of understanding of common threats can put confidential information pertaining to the business, clients, and employees at risk.

Here are five things that businesses and their employees can do to safeguard their data:

**1. Educate employees:** In many cases, it is an employee that accidentally allows unauthorized access into the company's network. By clicking on an unknown link in an email or connecting to an unsecure Wi-Fi network while outside the office, a security breach can occur or open a backdoor for hackers. It's very important for businesses to implement best practices and educate their employees on how to properly access networks and utilize technology.

Elaborate email phishing scams that affect small and medium-sized businesses are on the rise. The best way to defend against these scams is to educate your employees. Does the layout of the email seem odd? Can you validate the sender's address? Are there blatant misspellings?

Awkward phrases? If an email seems out of the ordinary or slightly off, it's probably not from a legitimate sender. Don't click on any links or attachments in the email, but instead, delete the email immediately.

**2. Use strong passwords:** When creating passwords, avoid obvious combinations such as "password123." It's shocking how many people will use simple, easy to guess passwords while attempting to protect important data. Passwords should have at least 8 characters, including lower- and upper-case letters, numbers, and symbols, and be implemented on your desktop, laptop, smartphone, and any other connected device.

Passwords should be changed regularly and should not be kept on sticky notes, saved in emails, or kept on a phone's notepad.

A reputable password management system is a good way to help

employees keep track of multiple passwords.

**3. Enable two-factor authentication:** The problem with a single password is that it can be easily hacked. Two-factor authentication is a security feature that requires two distinct variables to prove one's identity. This method requires a combination of credentials, such as a password and an automatically generated six-digit code sent to a phone. This creates a nice balance between security and accessibility to prevent invalid logins.

**4. Avoid public Wi-Fi when possible:** Since anyone can access public networks, the data on your device is vulnerable to hackers. When traveling away from a secured network it is best to use your personal hotspot. If you absolutely need to access public WiFi, be sure to ask the establishment the exact name of their network and only connect to that signal. Avoid financial transactions, password resets, file transfers, and other transmissions of personally identifiable information when connected to public Wi-Fi. Reserve these actions for when you have a secure connection.

**5. Have an automated backup system in place:** Manually backing up data is cumbersome and often

neglected. The best defense against data loss is making sure you have data backed up frequently and in multiple locations (such as on-site plus cloud solutions). An external hard drive doesn't cut it. What if there is a fire or flood or an employee deletes data? You need the data on your computers to be safely secured in a remote place. Frequent backups should be performed automatically with encrypted transmission of data.

# 11th Annual Stop the Hate® Contest Winners Named

Son of Immigrants, Samuel Oguntoyinbo, of Solon High School Named 11th Grand Prize Winner

\$100,000 in scholarships & anti-bias education grants awarded to students and schools

During a prestigious annual event held in Northeast Ohio, ten high school juniors and seniors competed for the title of grand prize winner at the Maltz Museum of Jewish Heritage's 11th Annual Stop the Hate® Youth Speak Out essay writing contest. The contest, focused on students speaking out in support of diversity and inclusion, has engaged an estimated 30,000+ student participants across 12 Northeast Ohio counties and awarded \$1.1 million to students and schools in scholarships and anti-bias education grants over the last eleven years.

The top ten essays, selected from thousands of entries, were read for an audience of 600+ at The Cleveland Museum of Art as juniors and senior high school students vied for a chance to win the grand prize of a \$40,000 scholarship. Samuel Oguntoyinbo of Solon High School, who is the son of Nigerian immigrants, was named grand prize winner. In his essay, he wrote of his experience with racism and passion for inclusivity, saying:

*I believe that once we educate others and reinforce our shared humanity, we can do away with much of the ignorance, bigotry, and hatred that plague us as a society. While this is much easier said than done, the pursuit of this goal is well worth the work it entails.*




# Beachwood Middle School Red Cross Club

Shortly after Ian Anderson joined the Marine Corps in 2009, his mom, Beachwood Middle School library assistant Debra Chuma, began to volunteer for the American Red Cross, which is the liaison organization that links communications between military personnel and their families.

Debra's passion for the organization grew and, for the past nine years, she's been serving as a Red Cross advisor and SAF (Service to the Armed Forces) volunteer. Last year, when she learned about the organization's middle- and high-school clubs, Debra sought more information, presented it to BMS principal Paul Chase, got approval, and put together a constitution to create the first Middle School Red Cross Club in Ohio.

"Certain criteria had to be met to register as a club," Debra told us. "After students were recruited, we were required to create individual programs that addressed military services, blood services, and disaster services."

She began by reaching out to BMS teachers who recommended students who displayed leadership qualities. Fifteen students were interested, and the club was born. Since the club's inception last school year, members have supported disaster-preparedness education initiatives at Hilltop Elementary; raised funds for those impacted by disasters; wrote cards of appreciation to members of the military and/or veterans; and promoted the collection of blood.

The club's first project was to create thank-you cards for blood donors here in Beachwood.

"Students learned about the importance of giving blood," Debra told us. "By creating cards, they were able to show appreciation to those who donated."

To fulfill their military project, students created holiday cards for those who serve or had served in the military. The Red Cross

Club provided all supplies, and all BMS students and staff members were invited to create cards in the library, which were then delivered to the Red Cross offices downtown for distribution through its Holidays for Heroes program.

To teach students about preparation for disaster services, the club hosted a hands-only CPR program for students and staff, and trained 45 people. It also hosted an American Red Cross Pillowcase Project at Hilltop Elementary School, a free, interactive preparedness program designed for youth ages 8 to 11. The program aims to increase awareness and understanding of natural hazards and teaches safety, emotional coping skills, and personal preparedness. Through an instructor-led presentation, students learned the best ways to stay safe and how to create their own emergency supply kits by packing essential items in a pillowcase for easy transport during a disaster. Students also had the opportunity to decorate and personalize their pillowcases and share what they had learned with friends and family.

Because of the buzz generated about the club, its size doubled this year. In addition to fine-tuning and repeating many of last year's programs, the BMS Red Cross Club implemented Pint-Size Heroes and Future Blood Donors programs throughout the district.

The club also hosted its first blood drive at the middle school. Students recruited their parents, many of whom were first-time donors. All club members were

involved. They greeted donors, manned sign-in and snack stations, and created thank-you cards. After the drive, the Red Cross provided information about where the blood was distributed, which made the process much more personal.

"This blood drive collected 32 units, which has the potential of saving up to 96 lives," said Mandi Kelley-Masters, American Red Cross account manager. "I'm so pleased to partner with Beachwood Middle School. Their program provides a wonderful way to involve students in mission-based work, and to help the American Red Cross achieve our mission of alleviating human suffering."

"The club is now working to schedule first-aid training, CPR training, and, possibly, a babysitting certification class," Debra added, "It's very rewarding to see how dedicated all of the students are, and to watch them grow because of our hands-on experiences."

Special thanks to Carly Margolis, two-term president, and all participating students. "We owe the club's success to a team effort," Debra said. "We're the first middle school in Ohio to create a Red Cross Club, and next year, under the leadership of eighth-graders Meira German and Karmanyaah Malhotra, Beachwood High School hopes to be the third high school in Ohio to create its own club."

"I love working with and volunteering for the Red Cross Club because helping others comes at no cost to you," Meira told us.

"I had heard a quote about leadership that resonated with me,"

Karmanyaah said. "Leadership is no longer about position – but passion. It's no longer about income – but impact, and the Red Cross is a great platform for many people to help others."

Another benefit of the club is that it encourages students to volunteer. "We are always willing to help at different events or community gatherings when needed," Debra emphasized. "The BMS Red Cross Club will gladly help with local projects, and the American Red Cross will track each individual's hours, which contributes to the 50+ volunteer hours that each student needs to graduate."

"Beachwood's club has come a long way since its inception just two years ago," said Debra Kellar, American Red Cross senior volunteer engagement specialist. "I look forward to a continued partnership with Debra and the student club members as we further our humanitarian mission within Northeast Ohio."





# CASA of Cuyahoga County Needs Volunteers for Abused and Neglected Children

**C**ASA of Cuyahoga County, a program of Child and Family Advocates of Cuyahoga County (CFACC), is a nation-wide network of 1,000 programs that recruits, trains and supports citizen volunteers to advocate for the well-being of children in courtrooms and communities.

Court-Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs), appointed directly by the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court, provide the court with information needed to make critical decisions in the child's life. CASAs advocate for each child's best interests in court. To be effective, CASAs get to know the child, and work with family members and other significant individuals in the child's life, including doctors, therapists, teachers, social workers, and attorney Guardians ad Litem (GALs). CASAs review records, attend court hearings and make recommendations to the court in the child's best interest. These special community volunteers advocate for the child through the life of the case.

CASA of Cuyahoga County needs more community volunteers to advocate for children in Juvenile Court. In Cuyahoga County, there are

more than 700 children under court-ordered protective supervision and more than 3,000 children who have been removed from their homes because of the great risk of abuse and neglect. Each of these children deserves the individual support and advocacy of a CASA in court.

CASAs only advocate for one or two sibling groups at a time. To become a CASA, community members must be at least 21 years of age, pass screening requirements, and attend training provided by CFACC.

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CASA of Cuyahoga County needs more community volunteers to advocate for children in Juvenile Court.

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The CASA program currently has 78 trained volunteers.

These community volunteers have dedicated their time and attention to 398 children, volunteering 10,570 hours on 194 cases. CASAs have been credited with reducing foster-care placement and trauma, reducing child welfare costs and care gaps, and helping to prevent transition problems for older youths. The work for this segment of our community has only just begun and there is a long way to go, but as a former foster child stated, "To give a child a CASA volunteer is to give them a voice. To give them a voice is to give them hope, and to give them hope is to give them the world."
